is around \$4.85. This difference in exchange amounts to about 5%.

Mr. Jacob Kirsh of Moncton, who has been purchasing furs in Charlottetown with his headquarters in the Frost & Wood building, has returned to Moncton until after the Christmas holidays when he is expected back again. Mr. Kirsh is a good buyer who has made many friends among the Silver Fox farmers here.

We had a reminder of days that are gone whose pleasant memories linger when a gentleman from Quebec called us up from the Canadian National Hotel the other day and asked if we had any live foxes for sale. We had just disposed of 100 via the hypodermic-strychnine route but still had a fair proportion left to make selection from, but as we had been doing business on a purely part basis for the past several years our acquisitory instincts were not roused and we answered in the negative.

Back in 1922 to 1930 with what eagerness, partially disguised of course, we would have fastened on him to be repaid agents, pointing out their desirable qualities as they flitted around the enclosures, but now the amount we would receive in exchange is so little above the price of

the pelts and the added factor that we are increasing our breeding stock causes no increase in our blood pressure when a buyer comes around.

It seems to the writer that for the future 95% of the ranchers will have to depend on the sale of pelts entirely as a means of ranch revenue. There will be a few of course who are developing prize winning stock or stock having a high pelt value that will command a premium for their fates, but the general rank and file if they dispose of their pupae alive will have to do so practically at pelt prices. This would be quite permissible we think among neighbors here, but a bad commercial proposition for the future should they be exported abroad in any large number.

Well, friends, we have been running as above for upwards of half an hour now and if you have read down this far you have probably had enough of Timely Notes for the present. We have taken on this job because it seemed to us there should be some medium of expression for the thoughts and feelings, cares and problems of the average fox rancher. We do not claim to be able to express them coherently but what little talent we have will be used from time to time in an endeavor to improve the status of our Prince Edward Island Silver Fox friends. In conclusion we wish you a very Happy Christmas.

Agricultural Short Course

The Provincial Department of Agriculture is again announcing a Short Course in Agriculture to commence on January 15th and continue for four weeks. This Course is designed for boys sixteen years of age and over. A wide variety of subjects dealing with animal breeding and feeding, cultivation and crop production, disease and insect control, livestock judging, marketing, dairying and other problems will be discussed by experts during the various sessions.

The Course offers a rare opportunity to the young men of the rural districts to more efficiently fit themselves for the great tasks of farming and rural life. It must be quite apparent that farming is not a haphazard and unskilled job, but is a vocation extremely complicated in its nature and one calling for a well equipped knowledge and balanced judgment. The ability to successfully meet the problems of production in its different branches, from soil analysis and cultivation to roughage and finished product, and intelligently understand economic and marketing machinery, demands a comprehensive study through every available source which includes reading, lectures, conferences and the great field of practical observation and experience.

The Agricultural Short Course is not capable of fitting any young man with his full equipment of knowledge for a great task, but it is designed for the purpose of bringing late and expert knowledge to those who wish to receive it, and more particularly to open out attractive and profitable fields of study which may be explored after the course terminates. Many of the students attending last year's course were delighted because it opened up new avenues of thought, built up in the student a desire for further investigation and study, and directed this into profitable channels of study.

Every farm boy or grown man should make an attempt to attend this series of lectures.
