Dodgers Uncertain Whether They Have First Baseman

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—Brooklyn Dodgers want to know if they have or haven't a first baseman for next season and president Branch Rickey has decided not to wait till the 1943 contracts are mailed to find out if Dolph Camilli really has retired.

Rickey disclosed today that Red McGrow, the Dodgers' chief scout, is in California and that part of his mission will be to check up on Camilli at his ranch at Laytonville, Calif., where Brooklyn's veteran captain last week told newspapermen he would not be willing to play for any eastern club.

On the report that Rickey gets from McGrow will depend what trading campaign the Dodgers undertake at the winter baseball meetings in the next month.

Up till now Rickey says "I only know what I read in the papers."

"McGrow went to the coast a couple of weeks ago and for two days I never heard a word from him. I didn't know where he was or anything. Why a man could walk to the coast in the winter is beyond me."

"I now have received a forwarding address from him, but haven't heard another word. I would say McGrow is just about the most uncommunicative man in the world."

As soon as Rickey settles the question of his manager for next season, the club probably will be done tomorrow at a conference he has scheduled with Leo Durocher, the club's next president, will start laying his plans for rebuilding the team this winter.

Rickey already has made a survey of the draft status of all the players on the Boston roster and has found at least a dozen who might be called to service at any time.

Sport Shorts From Britain

LONDON, Nov. 18 (CP)—When Opie Arnold Haves puts his mind to it, he's a fair sort of fighter. But when he's not in the mood, the Montreal negro can look mighty bad.

Holder of the Canadian Army Overseas light-heavyweight boxing crown, Arnold was in the groove against Jack Smith, a Worcester man who hadn't had a serious fight since he came out of Dunkerque, and took an eight-round decision at London's Queensberry All-Services Club. For Arnold, who put up a disappointing show in the quarter-finals of the British Army Championships at York last week, the win was perhaps his most convincing display on this side of the ocean.

Smith, regarded as a corner bet in the war, shook the six-foot Montrealer badly with one stiff right to the jaw, but was out of practice and couldn't quite cope with the rushing, swinging tactics of his grim opponent.

An uppercut that began near the canvas won the main bout, but the approval of the referee, light-weight champion, He knocked out Jake Kilrain of Glasgow in the second round of a scheduled 10-rounder. It was an unpopulated, surprise finish to a tilt that started on a slow, cautious note.

Kilrain, former British welterweight engaged in a comeback, collapsed on the floor, writing pain from the blow and the crowd boomed, believing the thrust low. The packed house also vented disapproval of the referee's decision, twice called to a halt and warned against holding.

Kilrain was convinced the knock-out blow was low. Boon found one of the finest body blows he ever struck.

Previous to the main match there were eight rounds of concentrated fury between Big Jim Wilde, the docker from Swansea, Wales and George Maitland of the New Zealand Army. An argument heard in favor of the Summerside site, that railway freight rates on outgoing shipments by way of Borden are lower from Summerside and that ship-losing expenses are less at the Summerside plant than at Charlottetown. It was believed that no suitable property has been made available in Charlottetown.

LONDON—Weird tales of things that happen inside a big airplane when it takes "evasive action" or when strange currents plague the air battlefields are building a legend of anti-gravitational flight that is more fantastic than Jules Verne ever wrote.

A wireless operator, new to the service, was amazed to see two pilots suddenly appear about the cabin of a Hudson bomber. He reached up to catch one—and found himself hanging on to it with his feet clear of the floor.

A beam suddenly on the floor of a bomber suddenly found himself lit from above in a way that the roof of the cabin and held there without visible means of support.

These stories, and more like them, are official. They are recorded by the R.A.F. from the reports of men well versed in a wide variety of flying conditions.

Pre-Convention Committee Studies Conservative Policy

OTTAWA, Nov. 18 (CP)—Resolutions before the Conservative pre-convention committee, which will be studied by the Winnipeg convention opening Dec. 8, range among other things, that party prices for agricultural products be established, that no man or woman be elected from the armed forces except into gainful employment, and that there be more generous treatment of war veterans and old age pensioners with cost-of-living bonuses made payable to them.

The resolutions demonstrate, one party spokesman said, that consistency and other groups have given careful study to the official report of the Port Hope, Ont., Conference. The latter conference held in September.

"Some of the decisions of the Port Hope conference have been revised, but it is very clear that demand is for a progressive policy," he added. Party platform is to be adopted, the delegates at Winnipeg will be kept busy during the three-day meeting, officers of the national convention committee

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S.D.U. To Open Winter Series Of Short Courses

The Extension Department of St. Dunstan's University will begin its winter series of Short Courses next week at Cardigan, according to an announcement made by Dr. J. A. Murphy, Rector of the University and Director of Extension.

This will be followed by a course at Murray Harbour. Both courses will be of four day duration, beginning on Tuesday and ending on Friday.

Outstanding educators will assist in these courses. Prof. A. B. MacDonald and Rev. J. E. Nelson MacDonald of the Extension Department of St. Francis Xavier University will serve as instructors and discussion leaders throughout the courses. Fisheries Superintendent J. B. Barry and Mr. John E. McIntyre will give special lectures.

A staff of local instructors will also take part in the course. A. Murphy, in addition to Dr. Murphy, will be Rev. F. McQuaid, Rector of St. Dunstan's University, who will speak on practical aspects of farming, Lloyd Lockery, Provincial Field Representative, Stuart Bursar of the P.E.I. Credit Union League, will speak on "The Structure of the Credit Union."

For the afternoon session the visiting officers and committee men will be split up into three groups: (1) members of the boards of directors, (2) credit committee members and (3) supervisory committee members. Each group will discuss problems pertaining to its own work.

A symposium on the work of the Credit Union National Association with Prof. A. B. MacDonald, Rev. Nelson MacDonald and Dr. J. T. Murray participating, will be a feature of the afternoon session. In the evening Prof. A. B. MacDonald will discuss "The Meaning of the Credit Union." Motion pictures will also be shown.

Study Club Technique
The study club technique will be used extensively as a teaching device. In the teaching of the principles of the cooperative movement these groups will be formed, and then report their conclusions to the larger group.

The evening meetings will begin with a motion picture followed by lectures and a discussion forum. Rev. Nelson MacDonald and Lloyd Lockery will speak on Wednesday night, and John E. McIntyre and Rev. F. McQuaid on Thursday night. The closing address on Friday night will be delivered by Prof. A. B. MacDonald.

The course is given entirely free of cost to the students attending. At Cardigan the daytime classes will be held in the Credit Union Hall and the evening classes in the Community Hall.

A Murray Harbour substantial by the time of the convention, which is open to the public, will be held in the Community Hall.

The opening session will begin at 11 a.m., Dec. 9. The day's formal program will end in the late afternoon and committee members expected to be busy until early next day.
