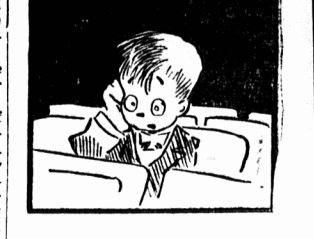
Radio Interference By Russians Stepped Up

Decision On 4th. Anniversary Of V-E Day

By JAMES DEVLIN BONN, Germany, May 8.—(AP)—Constitution for the first German government since the Hitler regime was adopted tonight over Communist and rightist opposition. The vote in the West-German Constituent Assembly was 53 to 12. The dissenting votes were cast by the convention's only two Communist delegates and a group of right-wing delegates from Bavaria in the United States zone.
