Food, Fragrant Fresh From the Hand of Nature to the Table

There is no reason for believing that fewer tourists will visit our country and Province this year than last. On the contrary there are many reasons for anticipating an increased number—those who visited us last year were well pleased and many of them will return; these will bring their friends to share in the newly found delight; the transportation companies yearly establish wider connections and through their liberal employment of printers' ink make the advantages and attractions of our country more generally known from season to season.

Last year the feeding of the multitude had grown to be quite a problem before the season reached its height, and the farmer with butter, poultry, lamb, fruit, or fresh vegetables to sell was hailed by the grocers and housekeepers as a sort of good Samaritan. If he can get his food fragrant, fresh and crisp as directly as possible from the hand of Nature, he is better pleased and incidentally his host gets greater profit. The moral is, if you expect to keep summer boarders begin to prepare for them now.

MOLLIE BROWN'S DEATH THE CIRCUS MOTHER

First Woman Rider to Stand Erect on the Back of a Galloping Horse.

SHE VISITED CHARLOTTETOWN YEARS AGO

And Was a Specialty With a Circus Company Which Performed on Rochford Square—Review of Her History and Attitude to Circus Life.

BROWN—On April 12th, 1901, Louisa, widow of William C. Brown, at her home, 1678 Harrison Street, Frankford, aged 70 years.

PHILADELPHIA, April 17.—The above modest little death notice published yesterday announced the passing away of the first of women bareback riders, the most daring and graceful of all and the ancestress of a long line of well-known circus performers.

For fifty years she appeared in the ring, first as a small child, then as the finished rider, and, last of all, as rider of high-schooled horses. Twenty years ago she retired, and since then Madame Brown has been a well-known figure in Frankford, and her home has been the Mecca for her numerous descendants.

Madame Brown was born in Germany, of a family of acrobats, and entered the profession when 5 years old. That was the day when the circus had not grown into the magnificent organization it now is, and travel about the provinces of Germany, France and Switzerland was a dreary, arduous affair, with the few little waggon and flimsy tents.

TRAINED BY THE TOURNAIRES.

The girl was taken charge of by the Tournaire family, famous all over Europe as acrobats and riders, and under their tutelage she first began to ride. They were original, inventive men, and it was to them that the modern pad and double-check bit on horses owe their origin. Trained by them, she learned to stand erect on a horse, to jump through hoops and over banners.

With them she journeyed to England and in London first began to ride erect. Nothing like it had been seen before and the city went wild with admiration at her nerve, daring and grace. This was in the early forties, and a few years later the family came to this country with June Brothers' Circus. Soon after arriving in America the girl became the wife of Francois Tournaire, the head of the family.

Tournaire and his wife never returned to Europe except for engagements. The London success was repeated in every city in the United States. An extended engagement was played in New York in the old Crystal Palace and afterwards in Philadelphia in a circus it is said then conducted by George K. Goodwin father of the present well-known manager. Boston and other New England cities were visited and as the country grew the route was extended toward the new West. Before she retired Madame Brown was wont to say that she had played in every city, town village, hamlet and cross-road of the East and Western hemispheres.

After leaving the June Brothers Madame Tournaire rode in all the old-time circuses, Dan Rice took her through the South the young P. T. Barnum just starting out, had her with his organization. She was also with Smith, Nathan & Sands forgotten by all except the boys of three generations ago.
