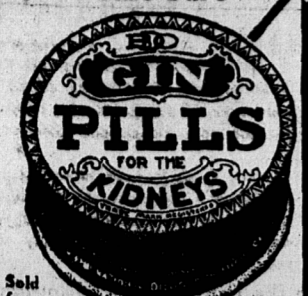

STARTLING EXPOSURE OF LIBERAL TACTICS

Hon. Mr. McKinnon Having Shown How the Leader of the Opposition Had Falsified Official Documents, Proceeds to Show the Tactics Employed by Other Liberal Members to Manufacture Campaign Literature and Get it Circulated Throughout the Country.

HON. M. MCKINNON continuing his speech on Supply, said: The honorable gentleman claims credit for starting the Experimental Farm. How much credit do the gentlemen on the other side of the House deserve for the Experimental Farm? This was the only province that did not have an Experimental Farm. Did they go, and on that ground ask the Federal Government to establish an Experimental Farm? They bought land, made it a free gift to the Federal Government. No province in the Dominion of Canada was required to do this.

Then there is something else I might say in connection with this Farm. It shows you fully where the "notes" are coming from. This was established when the gentlemen of the Opposition were in power, and I may say it caused us a little trouble in our time. When that farm was established there was a manager required. There were two candidates, one of them, Mr. Clark, who after some time got the position; the other, an employee of the Agricultural Department at the time, Mr. Ross. But as we are told when Mr. Clark got that position, the promise was made at the same time by the government that the salary of Mr. Ross who did not get the position, would be kept up to the same standard as that of the manager of the Experimental Farm.

This is the Mr. Theodore Ross whom the Leader of the Opposition was asking for; he came to us and told us of the agreement between himself and the government, and said, "As you are the successors, you are bound by the agreement. Mr. Clark's salary has increased; he is getting everything free, and according to the agreement I should be receiving \$3,000, and I must get it."

When the honorable Leader of the Opposition is asking where is Mr. Ross; I can only answer we could not and would not pay him \$3,000, and he decided that we should go, and we did not go. That was the end of that.

The honorable gentleman says: "We started all the associations." Does the honorable gentleman know that the best associations, the largest associations that we have in this province were not in existence in their time; they were started some time after they went out of power. Still the honorable gentleman takes credit for starting all the associations, the largest and best associations.

We have in the province at the present day the Egg and Poultry Association. Does he take credit for starting that? That association is today doing a business which this year will amount to somewhere between

a good deal of what he has said. The live stock interest of this province is worthy of a good deal of consideration. Without giving proper assistance and attention to live stock in this province, we can never make a success of Agriculture. At the same time, there is more than one line of live stock. The dairying industry is very important; but besides the dairying industry there are other industries requiring attention. Assistance was given to all of these industries since the present party came into power, far in excess of any assistance given by the Liberals. And when we hear criticism of the kind we have to listen to it shows the false impression they are trying to give to the country.

Referring to myself, Mr. Lea said that I am not an expert in live stock. I never professed to be an expert in live stock, but I would rather have a general knowledge of live stock than be an expert in one line only, and know no other line. I don't know that there could be any greater proof of the value of any man along that line. Not only did the general public put this confidence in him, but on one occasion one of the best experts in the province, and one of the largest dairy men, in sending to the other province.

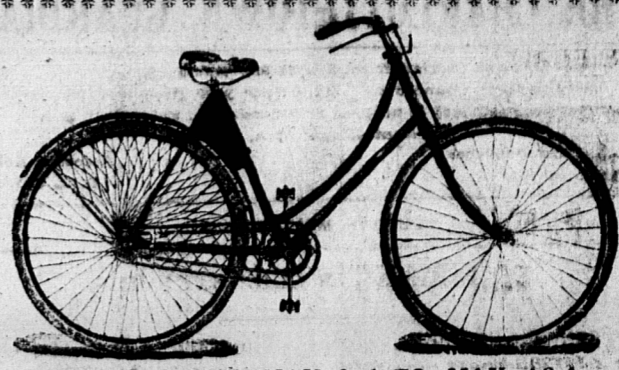

Government have not handled a single public question, or matter of importance without bungling it. That is one view presented by the Patriot. Right in the same column, the Patriot for getting what was written by the Leader of the Opposition came out with a statement, supporting a petition in favor of giving prohibition a fair trial "after enjoying the good results of prohibition." When that question came up in the House the Opposition voted against it—eight of them. They did not want it at all. It may be right or it may be wrong, but I think it is only just that the country should be given an opportunity to test the benefit of prohibition. No act passed in this Legislature is infallible; it is not final. But surely when all other countries take this stand on the liquor question it is worth while for this Province to take similar steps.

The Honorable gentleman from the 2d District of Prince (Mr. Saunders) made an exhibition of himself as far as bonds were concerned. He asked what authority the Government had to pay out \$75,000 for Victory bonds. Mr. Speaker, the House and every man who ever did any business knows a Government Bond is superior to any bank security. The Government has the whole country behind it; the bank has its shareholders.

We can take those \$75,000 in bonds to-day and sell them in the market and make \$4,500 profit on them. They are worth now 106; and they are not going to stop there. In six months they have advanced 6 p.c. The attitude of the Hon gentleman shows how much he knows about business.

He also asked what this Government had done in the way of public roads and bridges, and claims that they have done nothing, that they never made as good a showing as the previous Government. One would think from the statements of this gentleman, we were going to destruction, that we were collecting money and giving it away. I might remind him that during the twenty years, when they were in power, they spent \$223,000, on steel bridges. We in seven years spent \$207,953. In other words it would take the Opposition 24 years to do the work we did in seven years. They built twenty bridges—an average of one steel bridge a year. In seven years we built twenty three. Is that doing nothing? Is that not something to be proud of. I will tell the Honorable gentleman that when they are in long enough to equal our record, I will gladly support them. You will find at the next election the country will take this view of it.

He says in regard to mussel mud we made no effort to obtain it. For twenty years when they were in power they never raised one carload of mud. This party came in power, and with one small dredge, built as an experiment spread 50,000 tons of this mud over the Province. The country cut it at less than cost. It was asked why we have not done something at Richmond Bay. The mud at St. Peters Bay was an open bed all the year around. The mud machines run by horses could

not work there. We got a machine and scow, and it was very successful. It has been contemplated, and efforts have been made these last two years to get a railway to Richmond Bay, but the terms on which it was offered, we did not think it prudent to accept. We hope in the near future that arrangements can be made to carry out this project. There has been a charge made that we have done nothing for the fishermen. A great number of fishermen are farmers also, and anything done for the farmers is, to a certain extent, a benefit to the fishermen. The Fisheries Department really belongs to the Federal Government. How can we force the Dominion Government and dictate to them what to do? The Leader of the Opposition suggested that three steam trawlers should be procured for the fishermen. I want to tell this House it would be a most serious loss for the fishermen if this was permitted. The dredging machine or lifting machine was another thing he brought up. This machine was bought by the Government for the special benefit of the farmers of Prince County. It was placed in the Capital of the country, and the parties getting the benefit of it were not supposed to pay for the machine. We have a statement here from the member from Summerside that it cost \$75, an acre of plow in tiles. The cost to the farmer was not \$75, but was less than \$8, an acre. The Hon gentleman in his eagerness to find fault with the government has no scruples as to the extravagance of the charges he makes. He has made the most absurd charges probably ever made in this House. If this is the campaign matter he is preparing for the coming election I can tell him right now that he may as well stay home and let someone else run the election. The people know what the government has done; they know the ridiculousness of the charges he and his leader have made and they know they were not made for the benefit of the country but simply to try to besmirch the government.

Belgium to Sign The Peace Treaty

(Special to The Guardian.) BRUSSELS, May 6.—The Belgian government has decided to sign the treaty of peace which was discussed at a crown council held here last night. It is announced the council met at the palace at eight o'clock and continued in session until midnight. Paul Hymans, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and head of the Belgian delegation at the peace conference, speaking for himself and for his colleague, Emile Vandervelde and M. Vandenhueve, who remained in Paris, completely outlined the situation and gave a review of the peace terms. He expressed an opinion that the treaty as it now stands gave honorable and satisfactory terms to Belgium, and recommended that it should be signed.
