

U. S. CRUISERS UNDER ORDERS

For Turkish Waters. Vessels Under Reserve. Greeks Still Winning

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The United States armoured cruisers Tennessee and Montana have been given orders to proceed to Turkish waters to look after the interests of American citizens.

(Canadian Press) ATHENS, Nov. 8.—The Greek army, commanded by Crown Prince Constantine, occupied Salonika, the Turkish stronghold in south-western Turkey in Europe today.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 8.—Bulgaria has no intention of remaining in Constantinople according to an official of Bulgarian legation here.

(Canadian Press) ROME, Nov. 8.—The representatives of German Austria-Hungary and Italy during the conference in Berlin decided to propose to Great Britain, France and Russia a formula "Alabama for Albanians" as a solution of the Balkan situation according to the information received here.

(Canadian Press) HANDPINKENI, Nov. 8.—By wireless from the Staff of the Turkish Army at Handpinkeni, the Ottoman troops occupied Viso south of Tirmaro and have advanced as far as Kowakly, Bulgarians have not occupied Cheriu.

France, Great Britain and Russia are endeavouring to secure an adherence of the members of the Triple Alliance Germany, Austria and Italy to a policy of disinterestedness before undertaking mediation.

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NORTH DAKOTA MAN LYNCHED
