UNIT D STATES TROOPS IN CUBA

Gen. Funston Lands Two Battalions in Quick time, at New Headquarters

HAVANA, Oct. 7.—The first landing of American soldiers in the present occupation of Cuba was accomplished today with marvelous promptness, and tonight the second and third battalions of the Fifth U. S. Infantry are set off under canvas in Camp Columbia. The first and fourth battalions of the same regiment, which arrived this afternoon, also were sent out to the camp promptly. Today General Frederick Funston established his headquarters at Marianao, convenient to his command. Col. L. W. T. Waller, commanding the main force, and the entire force of regulars and volunteers will be under Funston's command until the arrival here next Tuesday of Gen. J. Franklin Bell, who will direct the distribution of the forces throughout the island.

Within an hour from the time that transport Summer came alongside the wharf the disembarking had been completed and the 856 men comprising the second and third battalions of the Fifth had been transported on street cars direct to the camp. Their baggage followed. The movements were so skilfully handled that the men prepared their messes and their own quarters. The men are in good condition and are pleased with their camp and its pleasant surroundings.

The disembarking of the first contingent went on much better today. Reports from members of the disarmed commission in various provinces indicate that the trouble which was threatened yesterday may be avoided although ex-rebels and volunteers in a few towns in Santa Clara province are still disinclined to be first to disarm and it is feared that American soldiers will have to be sent to pick up the demands of the disarmed commission. Havana, Santiago, Pinar del Rio, Matanzas and Puerto Principe provinces are practically clear of rebels and show no signs of trouble. Governor Taft, a special Secretary of State, and Gen. Funston are gratified in the situation, and believe that the difficulties in Santa Clara province will be overcome in a few days. So confident are they that Governor Taft and Mr. Bacon say they believe they will be able to start for home next Saturday. Governor Taft will spend the week after Tuesday in familiarizing his successor, Charles E. Morgan, with the situation. Mr. Morgan is expected here so that day. It is believed that after his arrival in Havana of Mr. Taft and Mr. Bacon the provisional governor will give a public reception at the palace to introduce Mr. Morgan to the people.

The moderates and ex-rebels in Pinar del Rio are preparing a love feast. The rebels on the north coast, however, are reported still to be rather active.

GLACE BAY, Oct. 8.—Business is piling along the water front at present. There are about ten schooners of different kinds in port today, some loaded with Island produce, and others with pit props. While one craft was loading coal for John's Harbor, on the Lakes. The prices of produce from the schooners are: Potatoes, 45 cents; turnips, 40 cents; oats, 52 cents.

The fishing schooners report poor luck. None of them got anything yesterday morning, being forced to come in on account of it blowing too hard. Bait is fairly plentiful, one schooner having jigged a barrel and a half of squid the other day, but the "dog fish are so thick," said one skipper, "that you could walk on them."

The work on the Coast Company's new shipping pier is proceeding fairly well, and the addition to the new freight shed for the Canada will soon be finished.

LYNCHING FOR BRUTAL MURDER

Fearful Conditions of the Arkansas Race Troubles.

ABOENTA, Ark., Oct. 7.—As a sequel to the killing of John Lindsay and wounding of his son, Policeman Milton Lindsay, here last night, presumably by Garret Colum and Charles Colum, negroes, H. Blackburn, a negro was lynched tonight at ten o'clock, at the corner of Sixth and Main streets. The trouble originated on September 13th, when a white man named R. R. McDonald killed a negro musician named Wiley Shelby. Next day at the inquest at the Colum's undertaking store, a difficulty arose in which Robert Colum was killed and Deputy Constable Ed. Lindsay and Garret Colum severely wounded. Policeman Milton Lindsay, a brother of Ed. Lindsay, and his father were walking past the Colum store when they were fired on from an ambush. John Lindsay was killed and his son severely wounded. When the police and citizens attempted to enter the store they were fired on. It is supposed Charles and Garret Colum did the shooting. Later in the night, thinking the Colum brothers were still locked in the rear room of the store, the place was dynamited, but the negroes had escaped. Early today Will Harding, a painter, was halted on the street by persons unknown, whether black or white he could not tell in the darkness. He was asked if he was black or white. On replying that he was white he was told to go back, and, while saying, he was shot in the back. Later James Mahoney, contractor, and Al

Belting, a reporter of the Little Rock Gazette, while going to see Harding discovered a house on fire. Mahoney fired his pistol in the air to give the alarm and immediately the two men were fired on from four different quarters with shot guns. Mahoney was painfully shot in the hand and Belting's clothing was pierced with bird shot. Today H. Blackburn, 37 years old, a negro, who conducts a confectionery store in Argenta, was arrested on suspicion of being the man who fired on Mahoney and Belting. As a precaution Mayor Faucette swore in fifteen extra policemen and the sheriff sent several extra deputies to assist the police.

Shortly before 10 o'clock tonight four masked men entered the police station from the road and one covered the trunk with a pistol while the others got his keys and quickly unlocked Blackburn's cell and took him out the back way. A shot was fired, and there was no disturbance, so that Policeman Pratt and two deputies who were standing on the street-two blocks away, knew nothing of what was going on until they heard several pistol shots at Main and Sixth streets. They found Blackburn dead, hanged to a telegraph pole, while the crowd were apparently merely onlookers. When first arrested, Blackburn said he only arrived from Lake Village Saturday night after the shooting. There was positive evidence, however, that after the Lindsay case first fired on Blackburn was out of a house adjoining and fired at John Lindsay, and that he delivered inflammatory speeches to crowds of negroes at several points.

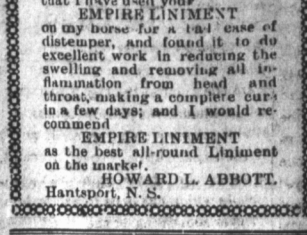
