\*RECRUITING MEETING.—A splendid recruiting meeting was held in Souris on Tuesday and the crowd in Hall gave testimony of the intense Patriotism of this community which has already sent upwards of forty men to the firing line. Lieut. Sterns of Souris opened the meeting and in a few appropriate remarks, introduced to the audience, Capt. Campbell, the speaker of the evening. Capt. Campbell opened his address by stating that it was unnecessary to go over the causes of the war, as it was the talk of every person and the newspapers spoke of little else. He said however that Germany was bent on destroying the British Empire and the British Colony most coveted by her was the Dominion of Canada. If Germany won there would not be a man in Canada who would not regret his holding aloof in this time of peril. Our place to defend Canada is not here, but on the battlefield of Belgium and France and though the fighting is 3000 miles away, yet should England be beaten we would then, be no longer in reality, how near home it is. The Captain then said that we were asked to form a reserve to fill the gaps in the firing line and as in Canada in fact, all the Empire were doing their part, should then P. E. Island be behind in sending forth her quota. No reasonable excuse could be offered for although a man had many affairs to take up his attention yet he could find a man capable of taking his place who for some special reason had to be rejected. His wife or other dependents would be well provided for by the Government and the Patriotic Funds and no man should be physically fit should at this time of need withhold his services from the Empire. The Captain then concluded his remarks by saying that even should we not enlist, one whole cause for which we are fighting, whether our occupation be on the farm or in the shop, we should do our "bit" for King and Country. Judge Fraser was the next speaker and in a few well chosen words explained why all young men should give their names to Captain Campbell and enlist in this Heavy Battery which is going forward in a few months to help the Motherland. After the meeting two recruits, Peter and Wilfrid Cheverie both of Souris went forward and enlisted. The meeting closed by the singing of the National Anthem.

### SECOND GREAT BATTLE IS BEGINNING

PARIS, Oct. 7.—The capture of Tapure and the hill behind it, is the signal of the opening of the second great battle of Champagne, which has opened most successfully for the French. Swarming down the slopes on the left bank of L'Ormoise stream, the French infantry rushed breast deep, through the water and stormed the village by an irresistible charge, which carried them to the crest of the hill and beyond. Although every house in Tapure had been transformed into a small fort, the French artillery again rendered these defences useless, and only a few Germans were left to guard the desire of what had been under ground foris. These were either bayoneted or captured. The magnificent work of their guns again soared the attackers any heavy losses.

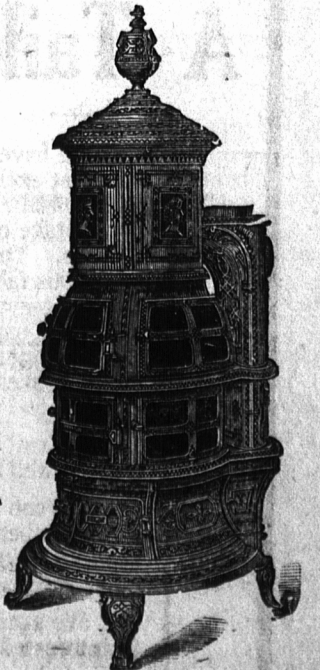
