### THE MEAT SCANDAL SPREADING.

The entire civilized world was shocked by the revelations concerning the filth and vileness of American meat-packing houses, and our neighbors spared no pains to spread the ill fame of the packers in this matter. Certainly there was no concealment on the part of the American press. The wholesome belief prevails across the line that in this as in other abuses and infamies, publicity is the first important preliminary toward reform and correction.

In England and Europe as well as in Canada the subject was exploited in the press with the full confidence that while all was wrong with the American packing houses, all was right at home. This self confidence has since been considerably shaken, even in Canada. The Toronto and Montreal inspectors have told how utterly inadequate is the meat inspection in those cities and they have given glimpses of the same filthy and disreputable methods in the selection and preparation of meat foods that have been exposed in Chicago, differing only in degree.

More recently terrible revelations have come to light in connection with the meat and jam canning establishment in London. The great metropolis which was horrified and disgusted with the disclosures at Chicago, now finds an almost equally bad state of things, but on a smaller scale at home. And from Berlin comes the story of Denmark and Russia sending to Germany the meats which were condemned as unfit for home consumption. So it is a tale of disease and filth all around.

But the inspection in European countries is declared to be much more careful and thorough with regard to living animals at least, than in America. In Chicago three veterinarians were assigned to examine 10,000 hogs daily. In Berlin an inspector does not pass upon more than twenty animals a day. The worst scandals so far developed on the European side appear to be in the working over of spoiled and putrefying meats and canned vegetables and turning them out in the form of sausages, canned meats, and jams.

It would now appear that no country on either side of the Atlantic can properly assume an air of self-righteousness as to having guarded the healthfulness and cleanliness of its meat and other food products. The entire tinned meat trade of the world, and the trade in imported sausages has been paralyzed. In the meantime all along we have had warnings from the Inland Revenue Department at Ottawa that there is much adulteration of milk, tea, coffee, spices and various other food products sold throughout this country.

It is, after all, an old and somewhat

wearisome story of the sale of unclean, unfit and unwholesome food. More than half a century ago Tennyson wrote that "chalk and alum and powder are sold to the poor for bread, and the spirit of murder lurks in the very means of life." A perusal of the current news is calculated to make one envy the farmer, whose food is so largely of his own production, grown under his own eye, so that he can rest assured that what he eats is always clean and wholesome. Our Parliament, Legislatures, and civic authorities will do well to provide increasingly strict and vigilant legislation and inspection not only of meats but of all food products that enter into the daily consumption of our people.

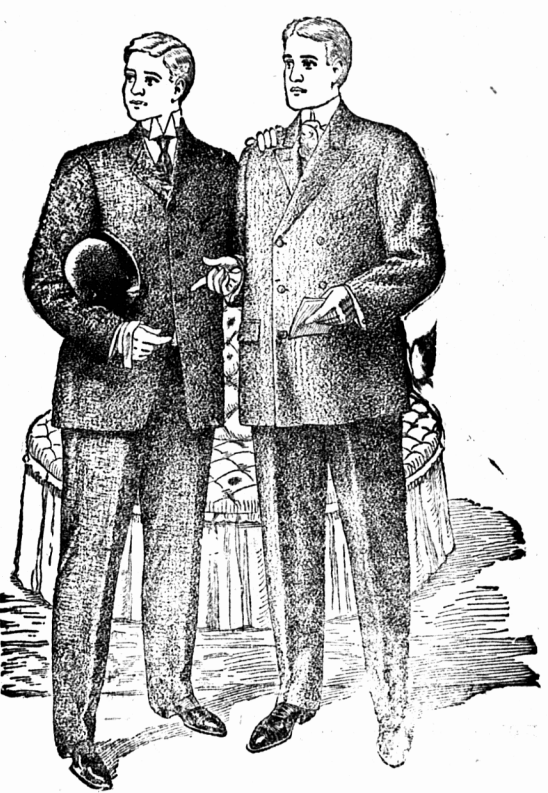
