CROP REPORT

WINNIPEG, Man., May 25—Cool, cloudy weather has prevailed generally throughout western Canada's crop areas during the past week. Practically all wheat is now seeded and coarse grains 40 percent to 70 percent completed. Moisture conditions are adequate for the present according to the weekly crop report of the Department of Agriculture of the Canadian National Railway.

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
