Largest Presbyterian Of United Ch. In Canada Holds Closing Session

The closing session of the P. E. I. Presbyterial, which is the largest all United Church Presbyterial throughout Canada, held its final session of the 21st annual meeting in Heart Memorial Hall yesterday morning. Mrs. J. D. MacFarlane presided, and Mrs. Watson Livingstone was recording secretary.

"Deep within every one of us there is a Divine center, if only we can return again and again to that center, it is the fountain of life," said Mrs. Frank Cutcliffe, Fredericton, as she spoke to the Presbyterial in the opening worship service; she was assisted by other members of the Pleasant Valley Auxiliary, Mrs. N. A. Cutcliffe, and Mrs. Milton Weeks.

Reports heard included, Mrs. Clarke MacQuarrie who as Presbyterial Secretary made an appeal for prompt, accurate, newsy reporting of a worthwhile nature.

Mrs. Roy E. Vessey of Murray Harbour reported for the "Missionary Monthly" and "World Friends" that there were 1155 subscriptions to the Missionary Monthly and 760 to World Friends.

Miss Louise Calbeck, Bedeque, returned Missionary of Japan, spoke with much effect regarding the revocation, which was made public this week, of the order-council concerning the deportation of Canadians of Japanese origin. At the 1946 Presbyterial the petition sent from P.E.I. to the Prime Minister of Canada protesting the deportation of Japanese Canadians was on behalf of the more than 900 members of the W.M.S. of the United Church of Canada on P.E.I. "Do we not feel grateful in the thought that our voice may have helped to swing the balance?" asked Miss Calbeck, who told of the most happy relationships that exist with Japanese Canadians who have come to our Province to live. "It is to be regretted that one boatload has already been deported from our Province to Japan where they will go into unspeakably awful living conditions, and where they will not even know the language, for having been born in Canada they speak only English."

Christian Stewardship

The report of the Christian Stewardship Secretary, Mrs. J. F. Easton, New Wiltshire, made a splendid evangelistic appeal to the delegates. "To be true stewards of the gifts we have from the hand of our Father; Christian Stewardship is the practice of systematic and proportionate giving of time, abilities, and material possessions, based on the conviction that these are a trust from God to be used in His service for the benefit of all mankind."

Mrs. Laura Bustin, City, reporting as Baby Band Secretary said: "We must sow the seed if we expect a harvest. The 22 Baby Bands reported are the seed that has been planted and that should be cultivated and cared for up through the Mission Band, C.G.I.T., and Circles to the Auxiliaries where finally the final harvest will be gleaned. The most important work of our church is planting the seeds of truth and righteousness in the hearts and minds of little children. Civilization moves forward on the feet of little children."

The Secretary of Mission Bands, Mrs. John F. Scott of Summerside reported 49 Bands with 824 members, who contributed \$1,310.33. "Strive for the certificate of recognition not for itself but for what you will get out of it." 1st year certificates were awarded to Mrs. Edmondson, Bridalbane and Georgetown; 2nd year star to Clinton; 3rd year star to Cornwall; 4th year stars to South Preetown, Lower Preetown, Bedeque; 5th year star to Bloomfield; 6th year certificates to Kensington and North Wiltshire; 8th year star to West Cape; and 9th year star to O'Leary. Worthy of special mention of Recognition in the Standard of Recognition, reduced to 1, Charlotteville, Malpeque, Margate, Murray Valley, North Bedeque, Pleasant Valley, Seaviewtown, Valleyfield.

Guest Speaker

The Presbyterial was privileged to have as a guest yesterday morning, Rev. H. O. T. Burkwall, of Edmonton, Alberta, who represented the British and Foreign Bible Society of Canton, China, for more than thirty years, and who is now acting secretary for the Bible Society District of N.B. and P.E.I. Addressing the gathering Mr. Burkwall said: "In 1946 the Bible was printed in the 1000th language, over 700 of these peoples had no written language until the missionaries learned their spoken language, reduced it to writing, and then through the Bible Society gave them God's word in their own tongue. The Bible Society is your co-labourer; with you are women of over 1000 tongues who know the gospel and are working with you. God gave the word and great was the company of women who published it."

Mrs. J. F. Easton presented the case for the "Gifts for Building Advance," that now replaces the former Special Objects Projects.

Reporting for Affiliated C.G.I.T. groups, Mrs. L. M. Murray, Kensington, said: "Here we are for the various church organizations, the response of the teen-age girl will amaze you. Much of the careful training of the Baby Bands and Mission Bands can be lost if we fail to provide a proper and adequate program of Christian Education for our teen-age girls."

Mrs. Frank Cutcliffe reported 7 Mission Circles, with 152 members. Reports of two Secretaries who could not be present were read by Mrs. R. E. Mutch, Mrs. E. H. Stewart, Montague, had a fine report on Associate Members work; and Mrs. Nell Darach, East Royalty reported for Supply work, 39 Auxiliaries sent sales to Mission Fields valued, most conservatively at \$1619.59 during 1946, an increase of more than 50 per cent over 1945.

Resolutions

Report of the Committee on Resolutions:

1. Resolved that we express our thanks to Almighty God for being permitted to meet in annual session and for the measure of success granted to us in the past year.

2. That we re-affirm our opposition to the liquor traffic in all its forms that we view with alarm the increase of liquor consumption, the resultant increase of crime of all sorts, the increase of delinquency of our young people and the subtle advertising of the liquor traffic and further, we protest the custom of social drinking and cocktail parties in so-called Christian homes and urge all our W.M.S. women and all women of our church to take their stand for total abstinence.

3. We view with alarm the increase in gambling indulged in by too many of our so-called Christians and we urge all our members to take a firm stand against gambling in any form such as: lotteries, bingo, betting, etc.

4. As members of the P.E.I. Presbyterial we give humble thanks to God that our Prime Minister, the Right Honourable W. L. Mackenzie King, has seen fit to revoke the orders against the Canadian Japanese, and further resolved that an expression of appreciation from this Presbyterial be forwarded to him.

5. Resolved that this Presbyterial extend their sincere thanks to the clergy, choir and secretary of this church, to the ladies for their gracious hospitality and to those who so kindly opened their homes to us, also to the janitor for making us so comfortable, to our guest speakers, Mrs. Henderson, missionary from Africa, and Mrs. Millar, our Branch President, for their very inspiring addresses, to the

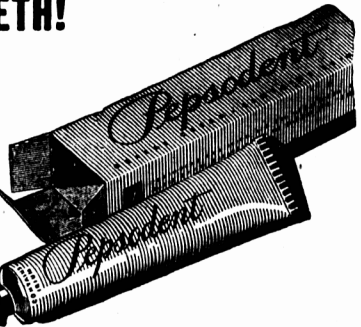

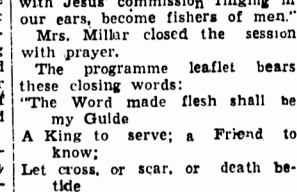
Mrs. Millar closed the session with prayer.

REBUILD HUGE GLASGOW DOCK

GLASGOW, Jan. 28 — (CP) — A \$6,275,000 (\$25,103,000) scheme to reconstruct Glasgow's Queen's Dock has been approved by the Clyde Navigation Trust.

The job will take eight years and the new dock, when complete, will have nearly 3,000 yards of berthing with depth of 22 feet at low water. Near the centre of the city, Queen's Dock will be provided with full shed and rail facilities and modern cargo-handling gear.

Deep-draught ocean-going ships up to 500 feet long will be able to use the dock. There will be 13 ocean berths.
