In Memoriam

MR. ARTHUR MACKAY

At the P. E. Island Hospital, Charlottetown on Wednesday, June 2nd, there passed peacefully to his eternal rest Mr. Arthur Mackay in the 93rd year of his age.

Mr. Mackay was born at Freeport, N.S., on Dec. 14, 1855. His marriage to Eliza Ellen Henderson also of Freeport, took place on March 4, 1880. His wife predeceased him six years ago at the age of 86 years.

At the age of 16 years in 1871 Mr. Mackay entered upon the railway service at Conway. In that year he was engaged with others in blazing a path through the forest in preparation for the construction of a railway line through the western part of the Island. He worked until 1875 in tracklaying on the Tignish line. He was then appointed regular section man at Conway and in 1882 became foreman at Emerald Junction. In 1908 he was promoted to foreman at Charlottetown where he has since resided. At intervals from 1908 he was acting roadmaster on the Tignish Division and on the Souris division as well as being extra gang foreman. He retired on pension in 1925 having completed fifty-three years of faithful service on the P. E. I. railway. Until recently he enjoyed wonderful health.

Mr. Mackay was highly respected and esteemed by his many friends. He was a gentleman of the old school kind, courteous and charitable. In his home he was bright, cheerful, hospitable and warmly welcomed his many acquaintances, who came to visit him. His life of temperance, sobriety, integrity, uprightness and deep devotion to duty may well be an example to others.

Mr. Mackay will be greatly missed not only in the home but in the church and community. For a number of years he was an elder in the Presbyterian Church at Summerfield. After coming to Charlottetown he was actively identified with Zion Presbyterian Church until 1925 when he became a member of Trinity United Church.

The funeral service at the home 288 Grafton Street was conducted by his pastor, Rev. T. A. MacLennan and Dr. H. C. Rice. The hymns sung were "The Lord's My Shepherd and Safe in the Arms of Jesus, Roy Smallman sang very feelingly and I Shall See Him Face to Face.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Sinclair MacKay, John Court, Gerald Murray, John Gordon, John Conway, Wallace Swan.

The burial was at Freeport, where the service was conducted by Rev. S. M. MacDowell in the presence of a large number of relatives and friends. The choir sang Rock of Ages and The Christian's Goodnight. The pallbearers here were Messrs. Harry MacKay, Arthur Smith, H. D. Smith, Edgar Henderson, John Miller, John Palmer.

There are left to mourn two daughters, Mrs. Reuben Rogerson of Summerside, Mrs. Austen Burns of Waltham, Mass., and five sons, James of Vancouver, B. C.; Rev. Alexander of New Mills, N. B.; Claude of Montague; Gordon of Charlottetown and Sirling of Albany. One son, Harold died some years ago.

Floral tributes so kindly sent by organizations, friends and relatives were many and beautiful.

28 Week-end Fatalities In Eastern Canada

(By The Canadian Press) Eleven traffic deaths, including four in an automobile-tram collision near Montreal, topped a list of 28 week-end fatalities in Eastern Canada.

A Canadian Press survey also showed two men dead in what police described as a shooting affray and two flying tourists killed in an Ontario plane crash.

The four collision victims were riding in an automobile which was struck by a Southern Counties tramway near St. Lambert, across the river from Montreal. Fatally injured were Arthur Custo, 25, and his mother, Mrs. Arthur Custo, both of Lewiston, Me., and Jean Louis Bouquet, 23, and his 23-year-old wife of St. Hyacinthe, Que.

Killed when their light plane crashed and burned at Barrie, Ont., were two United States tourists, Thomas Richards and Kenneth Pleiss.

A Simcoe, Ont., farmer, 42-year-old Seth Linton, was charged with murder after the Sunday morning shooting of Louis Stewart, 43, of Simcoe, and John Klipp, 36, Stewart's brother-in-law, from Vienna, Ont.

At Saint Mary's, Que., Emilien Roy, 14, was fatally wounded Sunday when a shotgun accidentally discharged. Other traffic victims were Leo Goguen, 8, who died in hospital at Chatham Head, N.B., after being struck by a car; Marcel Robitahud, 30, of Granby, Que., killed when a car overturned near Mansonville, Que.; George Roy, 40, of Toronto, when his car overturned; Horace Kennedy, Mount Albert, Ont., when a truck struck his parked car; Mrs. An-

nie Pearson, 61, Hamilton; Margaret Whittell, 11, Niagara Falls, Ont.; and Dale Allen, three, Kingston, Ont., were fatally injured in separate motor car accidents.

Twelve-year-old Lee Skerton suffered fatal head injuries in a playground collision with a playmate at Dayton, Ont., as result of head injuries received in a fall two weeks ago.

There were six drownings: at Sydney, N.S., Lawrence J. Beaudry, 51-year-old steel worker, fell from a trestle into Wentworth Park creek and drowned Saturday. Fred Baldwin, 39, of Toronto, was drowned in the Trent Canal at Hastings, Ont.

Other drowning victims were Irwin Brubacher, 19, of Hawkesville, Ont., whose home-made boat capsized; and William Adam, 10, of St. David's, Ont., who fell into a quarry pool.

Two bodies of drowned persons were recovered. The body of Mrs. Rollande Meerte, drowned last Tuesday in Lake Marois in Quebec, was found Saturday. The body of an unidentified man of about 40 was found in the St. Lawrence River Sunday.

Nine year old Kenneth Brownrigg of Montreal died of injuries suffered when he fell from the second-storey window of a house under construction. Another Montreal man, William Lynch, 78, died in hospital Sunday from injuries when he fell to a sidewalk last March 9.

Injuries suffered in a fall from the second storey of a Toronto restaurant proved fatal to Eileen Hartley, 38.

APPLESAUCE LOAF CAKE*
(Spicy and delicious... keeps well!)

- 1 1/4 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
- 1 teaspoon Calumet Baking Powder
- 1/4 cup butter or other shortening
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
