amounted to 11,133,200 pounds as against 3,918,700 pounds during January, 1932, and approximately twenty-six million pounds for the entire year 1932. Then again during the latter part of March, and first of April when prices weakened to the extent of about \$1.75 per cwt. we find there was practically a corresponding weakening in the British bacon trade. Still again, along this line of observation, it may be noted that last week cables from the British markets indicated some price improvement with regard to imported bacon. This, together, with some moderation in domestic supplies, suggest a reason for the half dollar advance in Montreal sales this week. This would lead one to believe that there is a definite influence exerted by the trend of British bacon prices upon our Canadian hog markets and while it may not constitute a complete argument, yet it is a factor well worth bearing in mind.

British Bacon Trade

Canada has now entered upon the third milestone of the five year period allotted by the British Government, during which justification, to retain permanently the two hundred and eighty million pounds annual bacon quota may be established. At the end of 1933, the quota of this market is expected to have been reached. So far this year rapid progress is being made each month towards improving our position and it is to be hoped that by the end of the year, we will have measurably one quarter of the quota actively and creditably close to the maximum quota allowed. The increased volume of bacon going forward to the British market since the beginning of this year, from a Dominion hog population of relatively small difference in comparison with the previous year, is resulting in the creation of an increased home demand which we feel, particularly here in the Maritimes. Yet in the face of these favorable marketing opportunities we are producing probably close to 25 per cent less hogs in this Province than we produced five years ago.

Our Next Quota

The quota of supply established by Canada at the end of the five year test period will undoubtedly be considered as the basis product, and will form the basis whereby quota allowance will be determined for future trade agreements. Our producers will do well to heed the urge to produce to capacity so that markets for a maximum production will be preserved for many years to come. What will the answer be this year from Prince Edward Island? Will we set a record for the Maritimes or will our production be the most important phase of the swine industry in the Province today. We have the quality, but we are absolutely down in volume.

Natural Increase

The natural increase, each year, of course, is determined by the number of litters farrowed during the season, and the addition to the production affected by the percentage of these litters that is raised to maturity. The question for the farmer to decide this year is just what proportion of his suckler pig crop he is going to feed through to commercial marketing age. There is the usual crop of scouts out this season offering their services as mediums through which young pigs can find their way out of the Province. Some farmers argue that there is more

money in disposing of sucker pigs at five or six weeks of age than at any other age, and buyers of such stock will pat them on the back in commendation for the degree of sound business sense they exhibit. This may be so, in the case of a small percentage of the crop, but what would happen if the annual hog increase was offered on this basis of sale? What would become of our hog industry? This is a year when farmers may well pause before adopting this course of least resistance. Careful consideration should be given rather than arriving at a hasty decision. There is quite a percentage of high pig mortality reported from different sections of the Province, which fact should lead to inter-community trade and thus increase the demand.

Price For Suckers

With the price of mature hogs practically double that of last year it is only to be expected that the price of \$5.00 or more per pair will be considerably advanced when sales are being contemplated. This year \$8.00 per pair is the figure most popularly quoted, although one dealer advised that he has been receiving \$9.00 for lots shipped to the mainland. It should not be expected that very many would leave the Province at a low amount, net to the farmer. Otherwise, with the prospects and indications pointing towards next fall it would seem much more in keeping with good judgment to turn them up to a 200-225 pound weight, and send them to the packing plant. There is considerable feed in the Province, at the present time, and this supply may well be supplemented with an early sowing of roots and green feed, and a few acres of grain sown with a view to early maturity, for hog finishing purposes.

Conclusion

It would appear as if the time had fully arrived when hog production should be looked upon in a bigger way than the "pig or two per farm idea" of a generation ago. Hog raising is a very important phase of general agricultural pursuit, and now with the opening of markets that give promise of greater permanency and stability, it is only reasonable to assume that farmers in general will take heart, and produce to such an extent that before long, Prince Edward Island will be recognized as the equal proportion in the Dominion of Canada, from the standpoint of both quality and volume.
