THE regular monthly meeting of the City School Board was held last evening. Principal Seaman addressed the Board on the introduction of Domestic Science in connection with our schools. After a discussion a committee composed of Dr. Jenkins and Mr. Blanchard was appointed to look into the probable cost of the introduction of the school. Principal Seaman asked permission to hold a school exhibit consisting of specimens of work actually done in the schoolroom together with exhibits of natural history objects collected by the pupils. The request was granted. At the request of the Col. of the 4th Regt. permission was given to allow the members of the militia who are in the employ of the the Board to participate in the coming review in Halifax. A letter was read from John F. Whear in reference to the enforcement of the law re cigarettes and tobacco, asking that all teachers in the boys rooms be requested to warn the boys against any infraction of the laws that any boy found or reported smoking cigarettes should be reported to the Board and that a continuance of the practice by any boy should call for suspension.
