"John And Chester" Loudly Acclaimed At Committee Rooms Last Evening—Victors Make Eloquent Speeches.

Tremendous enthusiasm, that of a party flushed with the tide of victory, prevailed at the Conservative headquarters last evening, as news of Conservative successes and Conservative concessions were announced. Brief addresses of gratitude and appreciation were delivered by Mr. W. Chester S. McLure and Mr. John H. Myers, members-elect, and by Messrs J. D. Stewart, leader of the opposition in the Provincial Government and Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan.

THE KING GOVERNMENT GOES DOWN TO DEFEAT

AS THE RESULT OF YESTERDAY'S ELECTION THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY RETURNED TO POWER WITH HON. R. B. BENNETT, PREMIER-ELECT, MESSRS McLURE AND MYERS IN QUEENS AND HON. J. A. MacDONALD IN KINGS ELECTED BY LARGE MAJORITIES—PREMIER KING, HONS. DUNNING, CRERAR, MacMILLAN, CANNON, KAY AMONG MINISTERS DEFEATED—CONSERVATIVES WILL HAVE A CLEAR MAJORITY OVER ALL.

THE LIBERAL "BLOC IN THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC WAS DEFINITELY BROKEN IN THE GENERAL ELECTIONS TODAY. CONSERVATIVES MADE SUBSTANTIAL GAINS IN ALL PARTS OF THE PROVINCE AND IN BOTH RURAL AND CITY CONSTITUENCIES. AT 11.40 23 CONSERVATIVES HAD BEEN ELECTED IN THE 65 SEATS AS COMPARED WITH FOUR WHO SAT IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS AFTER THE 1927 ELECTIONS. TWO MINISTERS OF THE GOVERNMENT WENT DOWN TO DEFEAT IN THE PROVINCE: HON LUCIEN CANNON, SOLICITOR-GENERAL IN DORCHESTER AND HON. F. W. KAY, MINISTER WITHOUT PORTFOLIO IN BROME-MISSISSQUO. MINISTERS ELECTED WERE: HON. ERNEST T LAPOINTE, MINISTER OF MARINE IN RICHELIEU AND HON. FERNAND RINFRET, SECRETARY OF STATE IN ST. JAMES, MONTREAL. FAIRLY COMPLETE RETURNS INDICATED THE ELECTION OF ARTHUR SAUVE, FORMERLY LEADER OF THE CONSERVATIVE OPPOSITION IN THE PROVINCIAL HOUSE. F. W. KAY WENT DOWN TO DEFEAT IN BROME-MISSISSQUOI AT THE HANDS OF DR. F. H. PICKEL, WHOM HE DEFEATED IN THE 1926 ELECTION BY 1121 VOTES. MINISTERS ELECTED WERE HON. FERNAND RINFRET, SECY ST. JEAN IN ST. DENIS, MONTREAL. HON. ERNEST LAPOINTE, MINISTER OF JUSTICE, QUEBEC EAST AND HON. P. J. A. CARDIN, MINISTER OF MARINE IN RICHELIEU. EARLY RETURNS INDICATED THE ELECTION OF ARTHUR SAUVE, FORMERLY LEADER OF THE CONSERVATIVE OPPOSITION IN THE PROVINCIAL HOUSE. A FEATURE OF THE RURAL VOTING WAS THE SUCCESS OF THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY IN THE EASTERN TOWNSHIPS WHERE THREE SEATS WERE GAINED. SIR GEORGE PERLEY FORMERLY HIGH COMMISSIONER IN LONDON AND A CONSERVATIVE WAS ELECTED BY A SAFE MAJORITY IN ARGENTEUIL. THE TWO WOMEN CANDIDATES WHO RAN IN QUEBEC SEATS WERE BOTH DEFEATED BY SUBSTANTIAL MAJORITIES—DR. ENGLAND IN MOUNT ROYAL AND MISS IDOLA OF STATE IN ST. JAMES, MONTREAL.

A feature of the rural voting was the success of the Conservative party in the Eastern townships where five seats were gained in Brome-Missisquoi, Richmond-Wolfe, Compton, Stanfield and Sherbrooke, the heart of the district returned a Liberal.

TORONTO, Ont., July 28.—11 p. m. E. S. T. Hon. R. B. Bennett Conservative leader, now needs but 21 seats to secure a clear majority in the next house of commons. With 81 returns still to come in, Conservatives are 49 seats ahead of Liberals. Two more ministers have been defeated. Hon. Charles Dunning, Minister of Finance, and Author of May Day Budget which was a central issue in the election. Hon. Lucien Cannon, solicitor general, defeated in Dorchester, Quebec after a stormy campaign. These make five ministers in all whose defeat has so far been announced. The other three are: Hon. W. F. Kay, Minister without portfolio, defeated in the eastern townships of Quebec; Hon. T. A. Crerar, minister of Railways, formerly leader of the Progressive Party in Brandon, Man., and Hon. Cyrus Macmillan, defeated in Queens, P. E. I.

The voting was close in a majority of the maritime constituencies. H. B. Short, Conservative, winning in Digby by a bare 38. Two sons of former Liberal members went down to defeat, H. R. Emerson, a son of the former minister of the same name in Westmorland, N. B., and Samuel Pickup in Digby-Annapolis.

TORONTO, Ont., July 28.—(9.30 p. m.)—The Government faces defeat—Conservatives have now such a lead that it seems unlikely that Liberals can recover from their early losses. Two ministers have been defeated. In all whose defeat has so far been announced. The other three are: Hon. W. F. Kay, Minister without portfolio, defeated in the eastern townships of Quebec; Hon. T. A. Crerar, minister of Railways, formerly leader of the Progressive Party in Brandon, Man., and Hon. Cyrus Macmillan, defeated in Queens, P. E. I.

Quebec bloc by capturing eight seats.

WINNIPEG, Man.—First candidate conceded election in the West today's ballot was J. W. Woodsworth, Labor, who was first elected to the House of Commons nine years ago. He is returned for Winnipeg, North Centre over two opponents, a Communist and one Independent.

TORONTO, Ont., July 28.—The first Conservative gain in Western Ontario was recorded by R. H. Sutherland, who defeated Hugh Allan, Liberal Progressive, in North Oxford. Mr. Allan represented the riding in the last house.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 28.—(By C. P.)—Hon. P. J. Veniot, Postmaster General, and New Brunswick representative in the Mackenzie King administration won a close fight in Gloucester. His colleague in Nova Scotia, Hon. J. L. Ralston, Minister of National Defence, won his seat by a substantial margin. Hon. Cyrus Macmillan, Minister of Fisheries, was leading the Liberal ticket, 800 votes behind the Conservative candidates at an early hour.

THE R-100 ON HER WAY

(Special to the Guardian) CARDINGTON, Eng., July 28.—The Air Ministry announced this evening that the British dirigible R-100 will begin its flight for Montreal at 3.30 o'clock tomorrow morning.

THE COURSE

The conditions forecast indicated the northerly course would be followed, perhaps the great circle course by way of the north of Ireland to a point south of Cape Farewell, Greenland, across Labrador and along the Saint Lawrence River to the Saint Robert air station at Montreal, approximately 3,365 miles.

Another Large Shipment Of Gold From U.S.

MONTREAL, July 28.—A further shipment of \$3,000,000 in gold is scheduled to reach Montreal tomorrow. This shipment which is being sent to the Bank of Montreal from its branch in New York will bring the total import of the precious metal to \$8,946,000 since the Canadian exchange climbed to the gold shipping point a week ago.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 28.—The Liberal Government led by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King sustained a net loss of five seats in the Maritime Provinces as a result of today's general election. The Conservative party under the leadership of Hon. R. B. Bennett, gained two seats in Queens, a two member constituency, in Prince Edward Island, four seats, Kent Northumberland, Restigouche, Madawaska and Victoria, Carleton in New Brunswick and lost one, Colchester in Nova Scotia. This makes the standing, Conservatives 23, Liberals 6. At the time of dissolution the standing of the parties in the Maritime Provinces was Conservatives 18 Liberals 11. Both the Minister of National Defence Hon. J. L. Ralston and the Postmaster General Hon. P. J. Veniot, won their seats in Shelburne-Yarmouth and Gloucester respectively. But the Minister of Fisheries, Hon. Cyrus Macmillan who deserted the professorship of English at McGill University for the political arena was low man in Queens, P. E. I.

An outstanding feature of the results in Nova Scotia was the defeat of all four members of the Liberal opposition in the Provincial legislature who resigned to enter the federal contest. These were D. A. Cameron, who was beaten by Finlay MacDonald, in Cape Breton South, E. C. Doyle, who was forced to bow to Dr. J. A. MacDonald in Richmond West Cape Breton, E. J. Cragg, who footed the polls in Halifax, and J. J. Kinley, who lost to W. G. Ernst in Lunenburg.

Nova Scotia, with 14 seats, returned in the General Election of 1926, 12 Conservatives and 2 Liberals, and representation was changed to 15 Conservatives and 3 Liberals at dissolution.

New Brunswick, with 11 seats, in 1926 returned 4 Liberals and 7 Conservatives. As a result of the bye-election in Victoria-Carleton, in 1927, representation was changed to 5 Liberals and 6 Conservatives, which was the standing at dissolution.

Quebec with 65 seats, returned in 1926, 60 Liberals, 4 Conservatives and 1 Independent, and representation was unchanged at dissolution.

Ontario, with 82 seats, returned 53 Conservatives, 25 Liberals, 2 Liberal-Progressives and 2 Progressives in 1926. The standing at dissolution was 54 Conservatives, 23 Liberals, 1 Liberal-Progressive and 2 Progressives.
