C. N. R. RADIO PROGRAM

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 11—Mabel Beddoe, Canadian contralto, will be the guest artist for the network broadcast on Thursday night next under the direction of the Canadian National Railways. Miss Beddoe, a native of Toronto, is a daughter of Tom Beddoe, noted Ontario tenor. She will be heard during the network hour between 10 and 11 o'clock Atlantic Standard time, singing from the studio of CNRT, Toronto. The Harkey string quartette will also contribute to the program, with a particularly fine series of excellent music. The broadcast will begin at 9:30 o'clock with a fifteen minute talk from CNRO, Ottawa, covering the department of agriculture reports. Then Toronto will take over for the next fifteen minutes, featuring a wood wind quintette directed by A. L. Evans. Previous to the network program there will be a local studio program in which Mrs. R. L. Steeves, soprano and Mrs. Kathleen Henderson, pianist, both of Moncton will be the guest artists.

RUSSIAN OFFICIALS BOBBED CHINESE EASTERN RAILWAY

MAKDEN, Manchuria, Sept. 8.—In an interview with the United Press, N. J. Mantell, American railway expert and adviser to the Canadian Government, alleged that the Soviet officials of the Chinese Eastern Railway had stolen millions of dollars from the road during the past few years. Mantell told a recent investigation he had made of the general railway situation in Manchuria. He charged that during the year 1923, the Chinese had earned \$63,000,000 but that the officials reported only an earning of \$130,000 to the Chinese directors.

Mantell said: "The Chinese Eastern Railway could easily earn 48 cents on each dollar gross. Therefore her profits should have reached \$3,000,000 in 1923. The remaining money was unaccounted for."

"The Soviets have had absolute control of the road. The Chinese representation in it was very nominal. The Russians, therefore, were directly responsible for the great graft."

"If the Chinese Eastern had been operated as other roads through China are operated, the Chinese Government could already have cleaned up its debt to the Soviet Union, as the present-day valuation of the debt does not exceed \$100,000,000."

Under the 1924 agreement (meaning the Mukden Treaty in connection with the Chinese Eastern Railway) the Soviets have obtained a stranglehold on northern Manchuria, which the Chinese government must remove somehow.

"The Russians have kept the books so that it is practically impossible to discover where the money went. But it makes it apparent that a return to the 'status quo ante' in Manchuria is intolerable."

Mantell and General Chang Hsueh-Liang, have been in frequent conferences since the American completed his survey.
