Pictures Of Recent Fire Which Destroyed St. Paul's Catholic Church At Summerside



The above picture of St. Paul's Roman Catholic Church, Summerside, was taken about 11 o'clock Sunday morning, just as it was becoming apparent that firemen were losing their battle to save the 70-year-old brick and wood structure from destruction by fire. Both these pictures were taken from the Summerside Court House cupola.

This picture was taken about noon, just after the upper portion of the 155-foot spire, with its large cross, toppled into the flaming ruins of the church.

For a time it was feared that it might fall on St. Mary's Convent, seen just to the left of the blazing church.

MANILA, Feb. 6 - (AP) - Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma acknowledged today that he issued the order for the Bataan death march, and that he knew 100 United States and Filipino war prisoners were killed at notorious Camp O'Donnell.

The suave conqueror of Bataan and Corregidor, subjected to cross-examination at his war crimes trial, paused after a flurry of prosecution questions and declared: "I am morally responsible for anything that occurred under my command."

Under direct examination earlier in the trial, Gen. Homma had testified he never had heard of the trek, referred to as a death march, from Bataan to the Philippines, in which 17,000 prisoners died, until he surrendered to American authorities in Tokyo.

Then Col. Frank Meek, Caldwell, Idaho, chief of the prosecution staff, who hopes to send Homma to the gallows, asked: "You knew you had 70,000 prisoners of war at the fall of Bataan, is that correct?"

"Yes," Homma replied. "I was in Manila when the Japanese General the admission he had not inquired into the physical condition of the prisoners. ..."

U. N. O. Delegates Are Critical Of President Makin

LONDON, Feb. 6 - (CP Cable) - Lack of strong and decisive leadership and guidance on the part of the president of the United Nations Security Council has contributed in no small degree to the difficulties the 11-power body has encountered in its first big test as a world peace tribunal.

Dominion and Provincial marketing legislation for farm products and the institution of a crop insurance scheme.

The resolution said there was no indication the farm and domestic labor service would improve during the next season and expressed belief the Farm Labor Service could "render valuable assistance to both labor and producer."

Considerable discussion followed introduction of the emergency farm labor resolution.

Other resolutions dealt with the grading of fruits and berries, farmers' income tax, federal research and the supervision and registration of nursery stock.

The 150 delegates, representing the Canadian fruit, vegetable and floral industries, passed another motion calling upon the council to "urge upon the Dominion Government that the establishment and maintenance of equality for agriculture in a balanced national economy become a fundamental part of Canada's fiscal policy."

Passage of Dominion and Provincial marketing legislation to ensure the marketing of farm products in an "orderly and economical manner" was urged in a resolution moved by the British Columbia and the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers Associations.

Deems Prisoner Labor

OTTAWA, Feb. 6 - (CP) - H. H. Hannam of Ottawa, president of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture, today suggested that the Canadian Horticulture Council urge the Canadian Government to retain 3,000 to 4,000 German prisoners of war in Canada until next fall to relieve the farm labor shortage. No action was taken on the suggestion.

Replying to Mr. Hannam's suggestion, some delegates said Canadian agriculture should provide for the training of Canadian servicemen and not German prisoners while others stressed the prisoners were trained as servicemen would not work on farms.

Apple Design on Stamp?

OTTAWA, Feb. 6 - (CP) - A proposal of the Canadian Horticulture Council that the design of a crisp, juicy McIntosh apple will adorn a Canadian postage stamp.

The Council, concluding its annual meeting, today passed a resolution urging the postal authorities to strike a postage stamp to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the first planting of the parent McIntosh apple tree in Ontario.
