THOUSANDS DENIED ENTRY TO ST. PETER'S

ROME, Sept. 4.—Fully one thousand women were refused admittance to St. Peter's on Sunday because they were bareheaded. This is the result of increased severity by Cardinal Pompili, Vicar of Rome, in carrying out the Pope's strictures against immodest dress.

In the last two weeks no fewer than 6,000 women have been turned away from St. Peter's by priests stationed there for the purpose, besides many of other basilicas. Fifty men in shirt sleeves also were refused admittance. Throughout the Holy Year all churches in Rome have displayed signs warning women against immodesty, but few expected that the cardinal would interpret the Pope's orders so strictly, especially in a hot summer when short sleeves are customary among Italian ladies. In some churches where women in short sleeves were permitted to enter they were refused communion.

### Place Names Of Prince Edward Island

By request of a number of Readers the Guardian begins in this issue the publication of the full list of Place Names, of P. E. Island, issued by the Geographic Board of Canada and referred to in a recent issue. Such terms as "Wright, 1852," "Holland, 1765," etc., are references to the maps published at different dates. The list is alphabetical and will be published from day to day as space permits.

Arlington; settlement, lot 14. The name dates from 1869 when a school district was formed. At a meeting on February 14 it was named Arlington. Earlier known as Brick Settlement. The name as Brick Settlement has no local significance. Armaida; settlement with post office, lot 42. Meacham, 1880. Armaida is the name of three places in Scotland—in West Lothian, in Sutherland and in Skye. Ashton; settlement, lot 42. Astyanax; rock. Hillsborough bay. Name on chart of Hillsborough river and harbour of Charlottetown surveyed by George Wright, surveyor general and George Peacock, 1839. Probably after a ship. Auburn; school district, lot 36. Augustin; cove, lot 38. Holland, 1765. After Col. Augustin Prevost. Refer to Prevost cove and point. Also Augustin Cove settlement. Auld; creek, lot 34. Auld's in Meacham, 1880, which shows Meacham and Wm. Auld nearby settlement. Auld's Mills were here in 1844. Avondale; settlement, lot 49. An Irish settlement. Named after the birthplace and residence in the Wicklow hills of Charles S. Parnell, the Irish nationalist. Plisquid Road was the post office name until November 1, 1901. Adondale post office closed May 15, 1914. Aylesbury; cape, lot 18. Holland, 1765. Burke's "Peagee" spells Aylesbury. After wife of the Duke of Richmond. Refer to Richmond. Bacon; cove, lot 65. Holland, 1765. After Edward Bacon, Lord Commissioner of Trade and Plantations, 1759-65, sometime M. P. for Norwich. Bacon; point, lot 62. See Bell. Back Road; settlement, lot 49. There are two roads heretofore. The settlement is on that "back" from the water. Bain; creek, lot 1. Township plan, undated, shows James Bain settler, here. Balfour; point, lot 14. Chart, 1850. Balderston, brook lot 31. In 1822 John Balderston Lincolnshire, England, came to the island and located at Belfast. He was a millwright and is said to have built the first windmill on the island, utilizing it to grind grain. His son Benjamin, born in England, also a millwright and farmer, moved to lot 31 about 1857. He died in February, 1876, aged 73 years. Baldwin Road; settlement, lot 51. After Thos. Baldwin, general merchant and farmer, who died about 1875. There was a post office of the name in 1855. Settled by Irish immigrants 1839 and 1841. Ball; cape, lot 24. Meacham, 1880. Baltic; creek and settlement, lot 18. Baltic creek on chart, 1850. The name appears to date from the Napoleonic wars when there was a heavy timber export trade from the Maritime provinces owing to the Baltic winter ports being closed to British commerce. Baltic; railway station, lot 46. East Baltic post office is in lot 46. Bangor; settlement, lot 40. A gazetteer name selected at a public meeting about 1879. Earlier known as Indian Town Road, because the road led from Morel settlement to an Indian reserve. Banks; point, lot 56. Chart, 1850. After a settler, Meacham, 1880, shows Wm. Banks resident here. Baptiste; point and creek, lot 9. John O. Arseault, St. Chrysostom, lot 13, writes: "Baptiste was one of the first men who settled in (Bogmont bay) St. Chrysostom. I remember my father and Baptiste's son, Hilario going to the point for marsh hay. Probably Baptiste was the first to go there for hay, hence the name." Percival point on Holland, 1765. Battis river on 1835 survey plan. Baptist point on Wright, 1852. Baptist point and creek in Meacham, 1880. Barbara; Weir; river, lot 19. Barbara Weir on chart 1850. The spelling Barbara Weir is found in the "Prince Edward Island Register", 1830, and it was also a post office name in 1855. Barbara Weir in old lease dated 1809, on Wright 1852 and on A. T. Todd plan, 1871. Lease, 1834 to John McMillan from Andrew Thornton Todd has Barbara Weir, hence a suggestion that the name was originally Barbary Weir, (barberry common shrub with red berries) but in a letter dated St. Eleonors, March 30, 1906 from Mr. H. G. Compton, grandson of Hon'ble
