VISITING PASTOR'S EXPERIENCE.—The Maritime Baptist says:—"Here is a partial solution of the pressing problem of the shortage of ministers for our rural fields. We wonder why no one has thought of it before and properly organized our forces. When Rev. P. S. Kinley, of Windsor, was making plans for vacation on Prince Edward Island he inquired of Superintendent Mason if there was a pastorless field where he might render some assistance by conducting services on Sunday.
