### NORANDA

The announcement of the offering of \$2,500,000 of first mortgage 6 per cent bonds of Canadian Copper Refiners, Limited, guaranteed by Noranda is of importance from several standpoints. It indicates that construction will commence immediately on the new copper refinery that is to be built in Montreal East, and which will provide Quebec Province with a copper refinery, as International Nickel Company and associated groups are doing for the province of Ontario.

The prospectus provides a favorable picture of operations of Noranda for the first quarter of the current year, during which earnings before depreciation, development charges of taxes, exceeded \$2,400,000. This would be at the rate of \$9,000,000

for the year, which would compare with \$3,494,000 of gross earnings for the entire year 1928, and \$6,708,000 for the year 1929. However, the company had the advantage of 18 cent copper, during its first quarter, and naturally estimates of earnings for the remainder of the year have been considerably reduced. Instead of \$9,000,000 the estimate is about \$8,000,000 which itself is twenty per cent over the total for 1929. Last year copper prices averaged considerably more than they do at the present time, and much more, also than in 1928.

### WINNIPEG ELECTRIC

Earnings of Winnipeg Electric Company for March showed gross of \$342,319 with net of \$174,828. Fixed charges and taxes, after deducting other income, amounted to \$92,937 which left net income from operations \$81,891. Gross earnings of the company were affected by the same conditions that reduced earnings during the previous month, namely general business conditions prevail-

ing. The street railway showed a decrease in passengers carried and while the earnings of the electric and gas utilities showed an increase, they were also materially affected as there was a decrease in the number of principal commercial and industrial electric and gas accounts, on account of lower production. The decrease in net comparative results was due entirely to the decrease in gross.

The month of March and the first quarter of the year show very substantial increases over the year 1928 March being up over \$10,000 and the three months more than \$37,000 over the corresponding figures of 2 years ago.

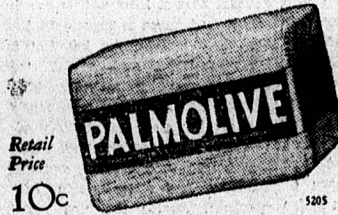
