cow "Malpeque Model Komdyke Bell" went to owner Colby C. Lewis, Fredericton. Her production in 1941, 17729 lbs milk containing 4,918 lbs fat in nine lactations.

"Wholfarm Daisy Queen" won the "red seal" certificate with a production of 17,827 lbs milk containing 3,948 lbs of fat in eight lactations. R. A. Profit, Fredericton, was owner.

The financial statement read by Secretary Cecil Miller showed the Association to be in a splendid condition.

Various items were taken up for extension of the Holstein breed. It was decided to help veterans and others who are contemplating building pure bred herds by assisting them in first purchase of females and financial aid offered to the extent of \$40 for any purchase of a fully qualified animal.

A discussion on diseases and treatment of dairy animals resulted in the offer of financial assistance. Facilities would be provided those desiring such treatment.

Grants offered for prizes at Charlottetown Exhibition amounting to \$6 for senior animals (2 yrs. and upwards) and \$4 for junior animals were approved. Grants were also offered to County exhibitors.

The Redistribution Bill which followed the 1911 census, I cannot feel that the present measure gives any sure guarantee against this unfortunate piece of parliamentary history repeating itself.

The amendment for consultation with the Provinces," he stated, "seems to me to offer a substantial measure of protection to the Dominion and Provinces is an established practice in our Canadian democracy. I feel that every program only by consultation with provincial governments, can a measure be drafted that will protect those in need of protection against the sheer power of numbers."

No Square Deal

Since the Confederation of 1867 Prince Edward Island had lost Mr. McLaughlin said, if the Province had not entered the union it now would have a population of 300,000 instead of a decreasing population. The Province was one of the best agricultural areas but it had had to carry on without any semblance of a square deal from the Dominion.

"It would establish a 'very dangerous' precedent if the Federal Government was able to change the B.N.A. Act without consulting the Province, it could increase its own power and reduce provincial power merely by a majority vote in the Commons. The members of the House could reduce the representation of P.E.I. to one or even nothing if it had that power.

"The procedure should be one which would prevent the Federal Government from taking any steps without first consulting with the province."

Mr. MacLaughlin said the greatest objection to the Government's redistribution resolution was the "arbitrary and undemocratic" way in which Parliament was being asked to ignore the Province.

He noted that the objections of Premier Duplessis of Quebec to the resolution were not against the redistribution proposal itself but were against the lack of consultation.

He said he disagreed with Justice Minister St. Laurent's contention that the people of the Provinces were represented in Parliament and no other consultation was needed.

Mr. MacLaughlin's Contention

While not opposing the redistribution resolution, Mr. MacLaughlin evidently shared Mr. McLaughlin's apprehension as to the out-
