St. Dunstan's College lost a good and faithful servant on Thursday last in the death of the janitor, Ephraim Lemaing, who passed away at the Charlottetown Hospital after an illness of two weeks. He came from the Island of St. Pierre and was a native of France. He had been employed at the College for five years and was well liked by all. He has no relatives here.

W. T. Ritch, of Ottawa, and W. A. Dryden of Brooklyn, Ont., federal commissioners appointed to inquire into the sheep raising industry in Canada and other countries, who were in this province recently, have been through N. B. and N. S. By reason of their wide experience both these commissioners are thoroughly competent to conduct the inquiry in which they are now engaged. Mr Dryden is a son of Hon. John Dryden and is known as one of the foremost raisers of pure bred sheep and short horn cattle in Ontario. Mr Ritch has had wide experience, having spent practically all his life in the business in one capacity or another. He was twenty years in Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India, and has visited the Argentine Republic, which is a notable sheep ranching country.

A movement is on foot to have the Victorias and Halifax, at the close of the league schedule and proposed post series for the Starr trophy, play a series of games in the Boston Arena for a side bet of good proportions. Ottawa and Wanderers are to play in New York along the same lines; and as the people of the "Hub" are famishing for a sight of good hockey, the patronage of such a series between Halifax and Moncton would be a foregone conclusion. It is the wish of the Boston Arena management that such a series could be pulled off and with this end in view, W. R. Vye, who has been coaching the Dartmouth college team, arrived in the city yesterday, and is already carrying on negotiations. Apart from its value as an athletic event, such a series would put Moncton and Halifax decidedly on the map.—Moncton Transcript.

Vernon Gay, city, has left for Saskatoon, Sask.

There were no cases before the police court in this city yesterday.

Neil McLeod, Summerside, was among the recent visitors to this city.

The smelt fishing season closed yesterday. The catch this year has been about up to the average.

J. A. Ferguson, T. Fisher and J. Gibson, Halifax, who have been in this province for the past few days purchasing produce, leave tonight on the mail special on return.

Frank Stanfield, of Stanfield's Limited, Truro, who is well known here, has resigned as Councillor in Ward 2 Truro, to which position he was but recently re-elected. A report states that his health requires close attention and may necessitate treatment abroad but this has been denied.

There is quite a construction proposal for additional rolling stock under consideration to be built in the I. C. R. new shops at Moncton. Recently in the iron department a large oil tank for the P. E. I. Railway was built and shipped to Charlottetown where the platform car for the same was being built. Some fifteen vans and one stores car are being constructed in the I. C. R. shops, six of the vans are already completed and in use and the stores car is well under way. The official car, No. 75, which was burned in the great fire, is to be replaced this year out of revenue by a new official car No. 75 built in the Moncton shops. Specifications have been prepared and orders given for the necessary stock to construct in the shops here during the coming season the following rolling stock—30 colonist cars, 3 stock cars, 1 refrigerator, 38 platform cars, 1 gas tank car, 50 box cars of wood, and 50 box cars with steel under and upper frames.

A case of real need and one which should receive the attention of those charitably minded, if not the authorities, is that of an elderly woman and a young chap of nine years of age who are living in the building usually known as the "Old Ladies Home" or "Coyle's poorhouse," on Spring Park Road. This woman and child are living in a building which, it is said, affords but little protection from the zero weather at present prevailing. There are two windows at the back which, between them, have but one pane of glass in the frames. Another window in the front is scantily protected by an old rug. Happily enough there are but few cases of this nature in this city and such being the case there is still less reason why any should exist. Perhaps it is because the case has not been heard of before or the matter may not have been brought to the attention of the authorities. From what can be learned, it is alleged that the building of that section of it in which the parties in question live, is one in which animals would be considered but poorly housed indeed, were they kept in it. Certainly some charitable organization will, without any loss of time, direct enquiries to ascertain the real condition of things and propose or effect a remedy.
