BRITAIN'S FOOD SUPPLY.

From time to time the question of the food supply of the United Kingdom is raised, and the hint is thrown out that the Kingdom might be starved, or reduced to the greatest straits in time of war by having her supplies from foreign countries cut off. The fearful ones are in part reassured by the fact that with the control of the sea which Britain's splendid navy assures, the danger cannot be very great. One proposal for the greater security of the Kingdom has been put forward and obtained considerable prominence during the Spanish American war. Had the continental powers then combined against the United States as was threatened, they would have been able to blockade the American coast, and this would have shut out a principal source of British supply, at a time when it was stated the food-stuffs in the country were not more than enough to feed the British people for fourteen weeks. The proposal was then made that granaries be established in the Mother Country and millions of bushels of wheat purchased by the Government and stored up against the time of scarcity, as was done in the olden time by Joseph in Egypt.

The British people require in round figures twice as much wheat from abroad as their country produces. It is probable that if all the fertile wheat lands of Canada were settled and cultivated the Dominion alone might grow a surplus of wheat sufficient to supply Britain's needs. These two facts are turned to account as an argument in favor of Sir Charles Tupper's scheme of British preference for colonial products. It is argued, with some show of plausibility, that a preference for colonial wheat, by the imposition of a small duty on foreign wheat, would give a great impetus to wheat-growing in Canada, and would greatly facilitate the rapid settlement of our vacant fertile lands. This would be a good thing for Canada.

But the British people are accustomed to sell to and buy from all the nations of the world. They have had over eighty years of continued peace with the United States and France, and it is more than forty years since the last war with Russia. Hence it is not easy to get up an alarm as to the danger of war with other great powers. It may be that there is an unwarranted sense of security, but we must take things as we find them. The fact is too that since the days of the repeal of the corn laws and the great national prosperity in trade and industry which followed that event, the great mass of British consumers are extremely sensitive in

regard to any proposal for imposing duties upon food stuffs.

The exception to this rule is the land-owning and agricultural classes, who so strenuously opposed the repeal of the corn laws fifty odd years ago. But the great masses in the cities and towns, the workers in the factories and mines, would quickly attribute any return of bread-stuff duties to the selfishness of the landed classes. That these would be benefited, or that Canada would be settled and otherwise the gainer by such a policy, would not count for very much with the mass of British consumers. They would fear that their bread would be made dearer. This danger is a disputed one, and a strong argument might be made against it, but the prejudice and the fear would still exist in the British mind.

TOLD BY SIR THOMAS LIPTON.

The Pipe, the Pet Dog, and the Canine Peacemaker.

PEAT FUEL FOR POORER CLASSES.

Now that the price of coal has increased to such an enormous extent in England, a result of the vast quantities which are exported to foreign countries, attempts are being made to obtain a cheaper fuel especially for the benefit of the poorer classes. Experiments are being made with peat. At Tregaron, in Cardiganshire, there is a vast bog, 4,000 acres in extent, in which the peat extends in veins varying from 20 feet to 50 feet in thickness. It is stated to be very rich in carbon, and attempts are to be made to extract this carbon and to compress it into briquettes after the process advised by some German scientists. These briquettes are stated to be equal to the best steamcoal, and it is estimated that the fuel could be sold in large quantities on the ground, at the small price of \$1.25 per ton.
