'Hour Before Dawn' Tense Drama About Dangerous Woman

A motion picture which completely won over the audience opened last night at the Prince Edward Theatre in Paramount's 'The Hour Before Dawn', with two splendid performances by its star-players, Veronica Lake and Franchot Tone.

'The Hour Before Dawn' adapted from Somerset Maugham's dramatic novel, is a story of England in the first days of the present war. The spotlight is focused on Franchot Tone whose peace-loving principles prevent him from bearing arms when the call to colors is sounded.

Tone's family, knowing of his dislike for physical violence, stands by him faithfully but fellow-Britishers regard his actions as a disgrace. Being of a wealthy family, Tone is forced to accept menial labor on a farm. It is at this stage that he meets Veronica Lake, a self-styled Austrian alien who had been

come practically a member of Franchot's family prior to the war.

But subversive dealings are going on propelled by a Nazi spy ring who lead enemy planes in targets in England. British intelligence is on the job and uncovers the spy ring with Veronica's vicious deception. Later she is taken to a concentration camp where she endures as a Royal Air Force pilot to deal out vengeance against her enemies. The excellent performances by Blinnie Barnee, John Sutton and Henry Stephenson make the film a riveting and thrilling picture. Franchot Tone and David Leland play their roles with warmth and sincerity.

Gallantry Awards Made Canadians

OTTAWA, June 13 (C.P.)—Stories of gallantry displayed by nine officers and other ranks of the Canadian Army during their fighting for objectives in Italy were told today with release by the Defence Department of citations covering awards for valor won by them and announced May 19.

Lt. Col. J.S. Ross, of Quebec, won the Distinguished Service Order for defying snipers and shell, mortar and machine-gun fire to reconnoitre suitable positions while serving as artillery representative with an infantry brigade during the struggle for the important stronghold of Ortona.

On one occasion, on Dec. 26, 1943, as he was making a reconnaissance in the outskirts of Ortona, a shell burst within 10 yards of him, knocked him to the ground and wounded his dispatch rider. His citation said: "Facing terrific sniping he coolly went on and completed his reconnaissance."

REGINA, June 12 (C.P.)—A total of 153 candidates have been nominated for the Saskatchewan general election June 15, including three who entered the contest Saturday in the northern constituency of Cumberland where voting has been deferred until June 24.

In Cumberland the candidates are: D.A. Hall, Liberal; R.O. St. Dennis, Progressive Conservative; and A.L. Lee, C.O.P. Mr. Hall represented the constituency in the last legislature.

Cumberland is the only deferred election. Voters in the other 48 provincial ridings will cast their ballots next Thursday.

The Liberals have 81 candidates; Progressive Conservatives 40; C.C.F. 52; other parties 10. Fifty-two members are to be elected, including two each in the districts of Moose Jaw, Regina, Saskatoon and Moose Jaw.
