MAE JUSTINE CLOW

The community of Murray Harbor North was profoundly shocked when on Christmas day, 1941, it was learned that Mae Clow (adopted grand-daughter of Mrs. Isabel Clow) had been called to the heavenly home.

The deceased was born at "Beach Point" Murray Harbour, P. E. I., on April 12th, 1891, the daughter of Clifford Jackson and his wife, the late Mae Clow. The child "Mae" was brought to her adopted home by her grandmother when only two weeks old.

A few days prior to her departure, she had not experienced the usual state of health. She had been attending several rehearsals for a Christmas Concert, where she had a part to play and was zealous in the training thereof. On the night of the concert, evidently, she was anxious to take her part; but owing to declining health, refrained. However, as her condition had become rapidly impaired, medical aid was sought and obtained; but as the hours ebbed away, it was apparent that the harbinger of death was near. At 1 A. M. Dec. 25, the heavenly Husbandman removed as it were this fair flower from Life's garden to bloom with charming luxuriance in the upper garden of God.

Obviously, she was prevented from singing in this earthly "Christmas Choir" in order to sing above with the Angels in the celestial "Choir of God."

At times, it may seem exceedingly difficult to submit to the disposal of a humble Christian resignation (we should not repine) but suffer our "Loved" ones to go; believing in God, that all His ways are wisdom and mercy, and that some day we will understand; and be satisfied!

A great vacancy will be felt in the public school where "Mae" was a regular attendant, and a diligent student, and among classmates where she was a great favorite. Also we understand that in connection with the Sunday School a keen loss is registered. But, notwithstanding this, the passing will be most keenly recognized in the home, where she was an object of adoration by all. The true situation there will be like in the following solemn but beautiful words: we will meet, but we will miss her; there will be a vacant chair.

The funeral service was held in the Presbyterian Church on Saturday, the 27th at 2 P. M. A very large audience was in evidence, friends, relatives and neighbours, to pay their last tribute on earth. Rev. Alexander MacPhail spoke feelingly from the words, "And He called unto Him a child" (St. Matt. 18:2). The following hymns were rendered: Jesus love me this I know, Safe in the arms of Jesus, Asleep in Jesus, And God will take care of you. Interment took place in the Murray Harbor North cemetery at 4 P. M.

Survived to mourn besides the father of Beach Point, and mother at home, are three brothers and one sister: Cameron, of Murray Harbor North, Alexander, of Cambridge Road; Thomas and Charlie at home and (Anne) Mrs. Lloyd Butler, Peter's Road, P. E. I.
