Saint John Man Is Named Captain

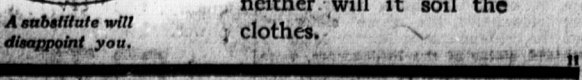

VISITORS ARE HARD HIT BY LOSS OF PLAYERS THROUGH INJURIES

FREDERICTON, Oct. 13.—The University of New Brunswick defeated the touring Bermuda Rugby football team here this afternoon, 25 to 0. The score does not indicate the respective merits of the two teams, the Bermudians deserving to make a better showing as far as score was concerned. Early in the contest the visitors seemed to become disorganized and the home team never faltered.

The provincial university, although playing only its second game, appeared to have a fifteen as good as that which went through the 1925 season without defeat, and all victories but one tied game.

Minus Best Players
 Bermuda had the disadvantage of playing fourth match on tour with a team that had been knocked about some and which was minus a couple of fine players, as Fowle of the forwards has a broken rib and left this evening for New York en route home, and Evans of the three-quarter with a bad ankle officiated as touch judge.

"A good team" was the visitors' verdict with regard to the U. N. B. fifteen. The Bermuda players, however, said that the strain of the fourth game on tour had told heavily on them in addition to loss of valuable players by injury.

Bermuda, despite the one-sided score, showed that their team possessed players with knowledge, game and ability to do some tricky play. The eight-man scrum, however, seemed to give them no advantage in heeling the red and black team taking the ball the most of the time. The extra man in the U. N. B. back field, however, was the great advantage. Bermuda complained of illegal putting of the ball into scrum at half time.
