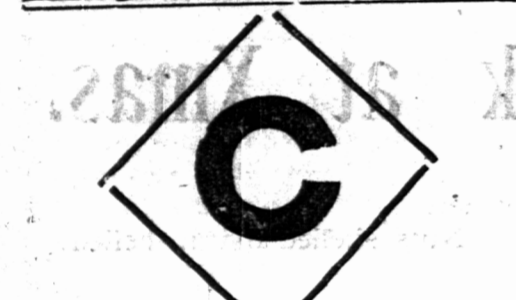

A NEW YORK correspondent of the Guardian kindly sends the following particulars of the death of Kenneth Macdonald, a native of Pleasant Valley, P. E. I., which took place in New York on the 23rd of December. He was well until the Sunday before his death when he began complaining of severe headaches. He asked Dr. C. E. Kennedy, formerly of Bradabane, to call over to Brooklyn to see him. When he got there he found him suffering from mastoiditis, due to an affection of the ear, which he had for some time, but which never caused him enough trouble to compel him to seek medical advice. The Doctor had him removed to the Presbyterian Hospital in New York, where he was operated on two hours after his admission by Professor Elliott. The same night he developed meningitis and died the following evening. He was an exemplary young man, and was for two years employed as motor-man by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company. His remains were embalmed and sent home to be buried near his father, who died some four years ago. He was the eldest son of Mrs. Donald Macdonald of Town Road. Interment took place in the Cemetery in Springton on New Year's Day. The service at the house was conducted by Rev. Mr. Simpson of Cavendish. His address was full of sympathy for the bereaved family and friends. The immense concourse at the funeral testified to the worth of our young friend who was removed in the bloom of his manhood.
