MONCTON HAWKS TAKE SERIES OPENER 4-2

Island Champions Are Eliminated By Mt. A. Team

Montague Primroses Wilt In Final Minutes To Lose 6-3 Verdict To New Brunswick Champs.

Mount Allison University team captured the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island Senior "B" and Intermediate hockey title last night as they turned back the Montague Primroses, Island champions, 6 to 3, in a sudden-death fixture.

Looking like winners as late as half way through the final period, the much-talked-of "Kid" line of the Mounties and holding a 2-1 lead, the Island team fell victims to a blistering, final ten minute surge that netted the visitors five goals that sailed away the verdict.

It was a game fight that the Island team put up against their more experienced opponents who lacked in more finished teamwork and outplaying them for three-quarters of the game, but the strain was too much for the Mounties who were unable to enter in that thrill-packed and exciting ten minutes.

Outstanding in the winners' case was the fast skidding line of Miller, English and Robertson, this trio accounting for all six goals of the colleagues.

Once again "Tid" McEwen was outstanding for the losers, and although beaten six times, he didn't have a chance on them. Beer and Grant were other stars of the tilt, the former's weaving rushes all through the game causing the press to speak of his "rolling" style.

It was one of the most exciting games of the season as the press noted the efforts of the opening bell. Not a minute from the start Ken Beer was robbed by Dickie after splitting the Mounties rearguard as the Primroses launched a pressing offensive. WINNIPEGERS TAKE LEAD IN BONSPILL

Several Upsets as Play For MacDonald-Brier Trophy Continues.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) GRAMME, LUBBOCK, Toronto, March 7.—Leo Johnson's brilliant youngsters from Winnipeg Strathconas remained the only undefeated rink in the MacDonald-Brier Bonspiel for the Canadian curling title as the fourth round closed this afternoon.

The Manitobans, seeking the trophy won by their Province on five successive occasions, humbled Quebec 15-7 after doubling the score 12-6 on Saskatchewan in morning play. Their rivals, the Ontario rink, considered strong contenders for the crown, fell before Alberta in the third round; and in the afternoon R. W. Crocker's veterans from Newcastle, New Brunswick, were forced back to hold second place with Ontario.

Johnson's four were never in danger today, though they had the experience, for the first time in the round-robin series, of being behind in a match when Saskatchewan got a single in the first end in the forenoon. After that they were never headed by either the sister Province or Quebec.

Tonight they were drawn against Northern Ontario, who broke into the win column and incidentally provided the thrill of the day by defeating Alberta 8-7 in the afternoon after Quebec had beaten them 13-8. Skip Jim Shaw's draw shot to tie two, and a heavy stone which went through from skip Orwell Stewart of the MacLeod, Alta., rink gave the Scots its winning margin.

Upset Dope Alberta, incidentally, caused chagrin to Hamilton Thistles in the morning, spolling their winning record with a 14-5 defeat. It was a battle of brothers, with three Stewarts from the Hamilton Campbell's.

The Thistles came right back in the fourth round to defeat New Brunswick. The New Brunswick rink defeated Nova Scotia 18-9 to go to lunch on even terms with Manitoba. But the Hamilton boys started off with a six-end in the afternoon and never let up. The final score was 23-9.

It was a day of cupulent scores. Saskatchewan scored a couple of five in defeating Harold Andrew's rink from Windsor, Nova Scotia, 23-5 in the afternoon, but the Saskatoon four under Club had no luck against Manitoba in the morning.

CANADIENS IN SURPRISE WIN OVER MCGILL

Hand Redmen First Upset of Season in 4-2 Win.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 7.—Canadians, the team that knocked the provincial champion Royals out of the senior group playoff, tonight pulled another big surprise when they defeated McGill University 4-2 in the first game of the final series for the Province of Quebec senior hockey championship. The teams play best-two-out-of-three, the second game next Friday.

It was McGill's first defeat of the season. They had previously won 20 games and tied three for one of the best Canadian records in the history of hockey. A capacity of 10,447 paid admissions watched the Redmen, favorites to oppose the Maritimes champions in the Allan Cup competition, be outplayed throughout the contest.

Scores Twice Roger Gaudette, fleet left winger, scored twice for Canadians while Rene Bourbonais, last year's winner with Moncton Red Indians, and Roland Robert got the others. For McGill, Kenny Farmer and Frank Shaughnessy, Jr. were successful marksmen. Nels Crutchfield, the McGill centre, who was injured recently, was able to see all three rings by sitting on the spot.

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, March 7.—Moncton Hawks hammered the Halifax Wolverines into submission here tonight and won the first of a best three-out-of-five game series for the championship of the Maritime Senior Hockey League. The score was 4-2 and the scene of battle shifts to Halifax Friday night for the second game.

Inspired by the great playing of Bert Connolly who turned in the best game of his career in Moncton, and scored Moncton's two first goals, the Allan Cup champions showed a wide margin of superiority over the Wolverines tonight.

Bert Connolly They scored one goal in the second period and three more in the final session and only the clever net-guarding of Leo Sargent in the Halifax cage, saved the Halifaxians from a worse defeat.

The Wolves, playing without the services of their regular defence-man, Frank Lavigne, failed to check the dashing Hawks as they swept in repeatedly and swarmed around the enemy cage throughout the first period. Sargent made several clever stops and some of them were sensational.

Terrific Hammering And while the Hawks rode in and around a defence that failed to check effectively, in return the Wolverines' front lines took a terrific hammering from the burly Moncton defence. Bill Gill, 198 pounds of brawn and muscle, threw his weight into the oncoming forwards and reckless abandon, picked several of the rushing forwards of the Stuart clan completely off their feet and crashed them to the ice.

The game started out at a slow pace as the two classy teams sparred for an opening. The Wolves got the first break when Leo Sargent was chased to the penalty box for tripping Lennon early in the first period. Hawks eased the pressure of marauding Wolves with fast shots down the ice and Foster was not called on to make a difficult stop while the team was short-handed.
