ANOTHER EMBARGO RAISED.—Owing to freight congestion the I. C. R. has for some weeks past refused to accept shipments of flour and feed from western to Atlantic coast points. Word has just been received in Charlottetown that the following has been issued by Mr. A. P. Wilson, Assistant General Freight Agent at Moncton: "Embargo on flour and feeds for human and cattle consumption has been raised until March 18th." This will, no doubt, mean that during the term specified, at least western oats will enter into competition with maritime province oats.

Another store displays an empty box and the sign: "Please don't ask for potatoes; I have a weak heart."

CORRECTION.—In the reference to the three returned soldiers in Monday's Guardian an error was inadvertently made in the name of Pte. Eckhardt Wadman, which was given as Woodman. Pte. Wadman is a son of Mr. A. H. Wadman, Summerside, and enlisted with the 105th going to England with the Battalion. During his

stay in England some slight heart trouble developed which incapacitated him from further military service and he was discharged with several others. Pte. Wadman is now in Summerside and it is hoped that with care in civilian occupation he will shortly be fully restored to health.

OF LOCAL INTEREST.—The following reference to the rebuilding of the McKinnon-Holmes Co. Ltd. plant at Sherbrooke, Que., will be of interest here as the McKinnon members sons of Mrs. Alex. McKinnon of this City. It is pleasing to note that the plant of McKinnon, Holmes & Co. Ltd., which was so seriously damaged by fire on the night of February 8th, has already been completely rebuilt and work has again started as usual. The damage, as determined by the fire insurance underwriters, was in excess of thirty-eight thousand dollars. The work of reconstruction was handled by the Loomis-Dakin Co., Limited and the Sherbrooke Construction Company and every available man was employed on this work. The fact that the work was completed in two weeks after starting is very creditable to the two companies mentioned, especially when it is considered that the work was continued during probably the coldest portion of the present winter. In rebuilding, certain changes were made which greatly improved the plant, and save for the special class of work done by the company. No expense has been spared in securing materials and rushing the work to completion.
