A meeting of the directors of the Provincial Poultry and Pet Stock Association was held last evening and it was decided to offer a special prize of \$25.00 for a grand championship stake to be competed for by its members at a forth coming Exhibition, the latter to be decided upon shortly.

The cheap fares prevailing on the Intercolonial Railway for Victoria Day will enable anglers to journey to any of the stations on the line and enjoy two or three days of good fishing, and will also afford a good opportunity for those who wish a holiday trip at reasonable rates. On May 23rd and 24th, single fare round trip tickets will be sold. These will be good for return up to May 26th.

Herbert V. Irving, Brockton, Mass., formerly of Cherry Valley, has returned to Brockton after a very brief visit to his home in Cherry Valley, where his mother was seriously ill. Mr. Irving, who is a foreman in a large factory in Brockton, could not remain here any length of time, owing to pressure of business. His brother David, a contractor, also of Brockton, was home for the same purpose.

Some days ago reference was made to a citizen who enjoyed the distinction of living through the reign of four Kings. For another aged citizen King George is the sixth British King under whose rule he has lived. That person is Jock Johnson recently referred to as having seen Halley's comet in 1835, who was born on July 16th, 1816, during the reign of George III. Besides that King he has outlived George IV, William IV, Victoria and Edward VII, and he is now a subject of George V. There are few of Mr. Johnson's age in this city and his friends all wish for him many continued years of health and activity.

The farm residence of James H. Stewart, of Dunstaffnage, narrowly escaped destruction by fire Wednesday morning. About 7 o'clock Mr. Stewart while going to the barn for his horses noticed smoke coming from the roof and he discovered that the fire had started, probably from a spark from the chimney. The neighbors quickly came to Mr. Stewart's assistance and after a hard fight succeeded in saving the building, although part of the roof and two of the upper rooms were considerably damaged. A large quantity of the furniture was removed, as it was feared at one time the whole house would be gone.

Passing reference has already been made to the draping of the Railway Station in this city, which was so creditably done by John Pierce, of Prowse Bros and Ernest Hertz, of Moore & McLeod. The exterior draping consists of black and purple wound over the arches over the east and west entrances. In the interior the windows and exits are similarly draped in black and caught up with purple ribbon and pointed at the top with purple rosettes. The stairway leading to the offices on the second floor is also hung with mourning colors. Many favorable remarks have been passed on the work. The Post Office Building also referred to before as having been draped, was done by John Pierce, Ernest Hertz and W. Heustis. The work in the Colonial Building was done by a staff from S. A. McDonald and reflects credit on the workmen.
