INTERESTING STATISTICS.

The Massachusetts Bureau of Statistics in its report for 1903 (the latest issued), gives some very interesting data concerning the nationality of residents of the state engaged in various occupations. Thus in Massachusetts in 1900, 99 per cent. of the entire wage-earners were of foreign birth, or born of a foreign father—a total of 1,025,572.

There were 300,000 Irish, for instance, at work 65 per cent. males and 35 per cent. females, of whom no less than 41,180 are domestic servants (about 14 per cent.) and 40,700 laborers. There were 53,556 French Canadians, of whom nearly 24,000 worked in cotton mills. There were 67,024 English, of whom 40,487 are in manufactures of various kinds. There were 30,457 English Canadians (this does not include the Maritime Provinces) of whom 43,680 are in manufactures. There were 23,648 Nova Scotians, of whom 12,304 are in manufactures. There were 25,039 Scotch, of whom 13,403 are in manufactures. There were 9,457 New Brunswickers, of whom 4,572 are in manufactures. There were 4,137 Newfoundlanders, of whom 1,806 are in manufactures. There were 4,725 P. E. Islanders of whom 2,093 are in manufactures.

The persons referred to above are those who are actually wage-earners, and the unemployed men, women and children are not included. The figures show that there are in government employ in the state (chiefly politicians) no less than 6,442 Irish, against 10,239 Americans. The French Canadians have 1,610 children at work as wage-earners, or six times as many as the Irish in proportion to their numbers. The Portuguese also put their children at work to a great extent, while all other nationalities keep them in school. Following the profession—clergy, artists, physicians, scientists, educators and actors—there are 2,947 Englishmen, 674 English Canadians, 523 Nova Scotians, 854 Scotchmen, 357 New Brunswickers, 63 Newfoundlanders, 37 P. E. Islanders.—The Inter-Nation.

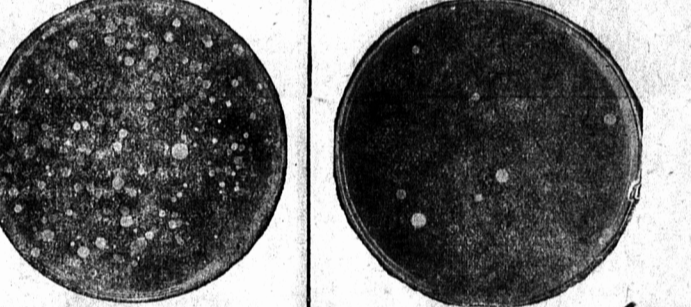
