

BENEFICIAL RESULTS FROM OTTAWA PACTS

Largely Increased Interchange of Products Within The Empire Is Noted.

MONTREAL, Nov. 21—Exchange fluctuations are hampering international trade and are "astonishing" in their scope, President, Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Borden told the annual meeting of Barclays Bank (Canada) held here today.

Despite the complexity in the relations of the Canadian dollar to sterling, a largely increased interchange of products within the Empire affords assurance that mutually beneficial results are arising from the Ottawa Conference of last year, said the President.

Directors Re-elected

The retiring directors were all re-elected and at a subsequent meeting of the directors Sir Robert Borden was again elected President and Arthur B. Purvis was elected Vice President.

In presenting the report of the year's operations, Sir Robert Borden adverted to the advance in the number of accounts, which he said was substantial and to the balances which he said indicated that the bank was making steady progress.

Turning to general business conditions the President said the present outlook was hopeful. He added: "Contrasting the present situation with that of last Autumn, we are justified in believing that an upturn in economic and business conditions has begun. Not only in our own country but in the United States, in Great Britain, in France and in other European countries there has been such distinct advance as serves to encourage this belief."

Railway Presidents Will Consider Amalgamation

OTTAWA, Nov. 21—(C.P.)—Re-warding to the two railway presentations of Premier L. P. D. Tilley, of New Brunswick, touching upon amalgamation of certain departments of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways in that Province have been forwarded by Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals, and President E. W. Beatty of the C. P. R. and President S. J. Hungerford of the C. N. R.

The two railway presidents are the responsible heads dealing with any amalgamation of departments; while no official statement could be made here in the circumstances it is understood that the systems have been proposing an amalgamation of a couple of railway shops in New Brunswick as a means of economy without impairing the services.

U. S. Musicians Object To Jap Treatment

TOKYO, Nov. 20—(A.P.)—Arthur Garrels, United States Consul General, "officially remonstrated" at Metropolitan police headquarters today against police treatment of 10 Americans comprising Jerry Woods' orchestra—formerly employed at Dehoney's ballroom in Portland, Ore.

Police, intervening in a contract dispute between the musicians and their Japanese employers at the Ginza dance hall Saturday, arrested the Americans.

The musicians, freed after several hours detention, claimed the police forcibly took away their passports.

Authorities promised Garrels an investigation and protection of the musicians.

Large advances from last year have been made in Canadian exports to the United Kingdom for the first nine months of this year, particularly in wheat, flour, cattle and timber.

Further Deaths Reported In Spanish Elections

MADRID, Nov. 22—(A.P.) The death toll from Spain's first constitutional elections rose from seven to nine tonight when reports reached here that two persons had been killed in the isolated village of Paracela. The reports said Socialists fired upon a group of people while they were voting, killing two and injuring another. The previous number of known injured was 300.

Rightists Landslide

The Rightists landslide indicated in early returns became more evident in each successive bulletin. The latest general semi-official returns indicated the election of 349 Rightists, although their headquarters assured the election of 209.

Meanwhile throughout the country the government continued to maintain extreme vigilance to prevent further violence. Leftist reprisals are feared, it was learned, particularly from troops commanded by Leftist officers.

The available returns brought to light the curious feature that women, given suffrage for the first time in Spain's history, apparently failed to support feminine candidates. Available returns show not one woman candidate victorious.

Macaroni and Almond Pudding

Have 2 ounces of macaroni, cut it into small lengths, 1 ounce of butter, 2 ounces of castor sugar, half a pint of milk and 2 eggs. Blanch 1 ounce of Valencia almonds, chop them well. Simmer the macaroni in the milk and sugar until tender. Allow the macaroni to cool, then add the butter, also the eggs, which should be well beaten. Beat the mixture for some minutes, turn into a buttered pie dish, and bake in a moderate oven; if liked, sprinkle a little mixed spice on top before placing in the oven, or perhaps a little cinnamon

TORONTO, Nov. 20—A half hundred boys and girls assembled here today from all parts of Canada to compete in the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair judging competitions. They were winners of local and provincial elimination tests. Here they will judge dairy cattle, beef cattle, swine and poultry, grain and potatoes.

Two girls from Prince Edward Island and a dozen boys, eight from Nova Scotia and four from New Brunswick—arrived under the guardianship of E. F. Pineau, Dominion Livestock Branch, Caraquet, N.
