Allan Cup Champs Down Wolverines In Torrid Tilt

Frankie Graham Suffers Severe Eye Injury In Opening Period Of Bruising Game James And Irvine Also On Injured List.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, Feb. 5.—Moncton Hawks tightened their grip on the leadership of the Maritime "Big Four" League here tonight by defeating the Halifax Wolverines 4-2. The victory moved the Allan Cup champions two full games ahead of the second place Wolfpack who in turn are safely entrenched over the third place Abegweits.

One of the best displays of he-man hockey staged here in many moons was marred by a regrettable injury to Frankie Graham, star defenceman of the Wolves.

Early in the first period as the Hawks ganged the Halifax net, "Chummy" Lawlor, Wolverines right winger, attempted to "lift" the puck up the ice, and it struck Graham in the eye. It was a hard shot and knocked Graham down. Writting in pain he was carried to the Halifax dressing room and later conveyed to the City Hospital where medical men are conducting a careful examination. It was stated after the game that the extent of the injuries were not definitely known although it is feared that the optic may be injured.

James Ferguson took over Graham's duties on defence and turned a splendid game. Shortly after Graham's injury Dud James limped from the ice and was taken to the dressing room. In a raid on the Halifax net he was knuckered by Frankie Lavigne and as a result is nursing a severe charley horse in his left thigh, which may keep him idle for a day or two. Two other players were injured in the third period. Knucker Irvine fell in a fast rating thrust in Halifax territory, and he limped off the ice. He is injured in the area of his spine and in addition was accidentally cut by a player's skate in the right thigh.

Tonight's game was fast and furious and fairly wide-open. It was scored by about 3,000 fans who cheered themselves hoarse as the men displayed thrilling hockey every second of the way.

Penalties proved costly to the Wolverines. Lavigne and Cowley awoke with Bert Connolly. Two other players were injured in the second period, and Moshier was with the timers when the puck was shot into the net. The last Moncton goal was scored at 10:05 when Webster scored before the bell when Webster scored a long shot up the ice and sent Sargent at his mercy.

Moncton's big opportunity came when midway through the second period when Lavigne and Connolly were banished together for roughing, and Cowley followed for hauling feet from under Irvine. While these players were in the penalty box McManus rushed from his own territory, down left wing and inside the Halifax blue-line, and scored from near the boards, which Sargent missed completely.

Less than five minutes later while Moshier was in the penalty box for holding Irvine across the face with his stick, McManus got on the end of a fast, Miller-Webster combination and scored from the goal-mouth, leaving Sargent out.

Halifax, whose well placed attacks were packed with dynamite throughout the game, started the third, one goal down and forced the play as they battled for the equalizer. CONACHER STILL LEADS N.H.L. SNIPERS

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, Feb. 5.—The big three in National Hockey League scoring this season advanced solidly during the past week to ensure a wide margin over all other marksmen. They are Charlie Conacher and Joe Primeau, right wing and centre, respectively, of the Toronto Maple Leafs, and Frankie Boucher, centre of New York Rangers. Chuk added five points during the week and the other four each. Tonight's scoring statistics, issued by President Frank Calder, showed Conacher with 26 goals, 15 assists, for 40 points and Primeau and Boucher tied for second, Primeau with 10-24 for 34 points and Boucher with exactly the same figures.

Maple Leafs and Rangers held all the honors, but one or two other players have secured good records. Aurel Joliat, who next Thursday will take part in his 500th game, all with Montreal Canadiens, has scored 15 goals, 10 assists for 25 points and Nels Stewart of Boston, with 24 points, is equal to Bun Cook, Rangers, in a third-place tie in the United States division. Bill Cook's gradual climb has landed him in fifth place in this section with 23 points. He is hoping to score his 200th Ranger goal in his next game.

Frank Boucher holds a wide lead among leaders in clean play, having only two minutes compared with six for Joe Primeau. Red Horner's 115 minutes makes the Leaf defenceman far the "bad man" of the league.

Saint John Team Holds Abegweits To 3-All Draw

Beaver Squad Remain In Running For Play-off Berth As Result Of Last Night's Encounter — Beaton And Houston Get Two Goals Apiece.

On the short end of a 3-2 score, going into the final period, to the highly-improved Saint John Beavers last night, the local Abegweits had the necessary punch to come from behind to knot the count at 3-all, a ten minute overtime session failing to break the deadlock.

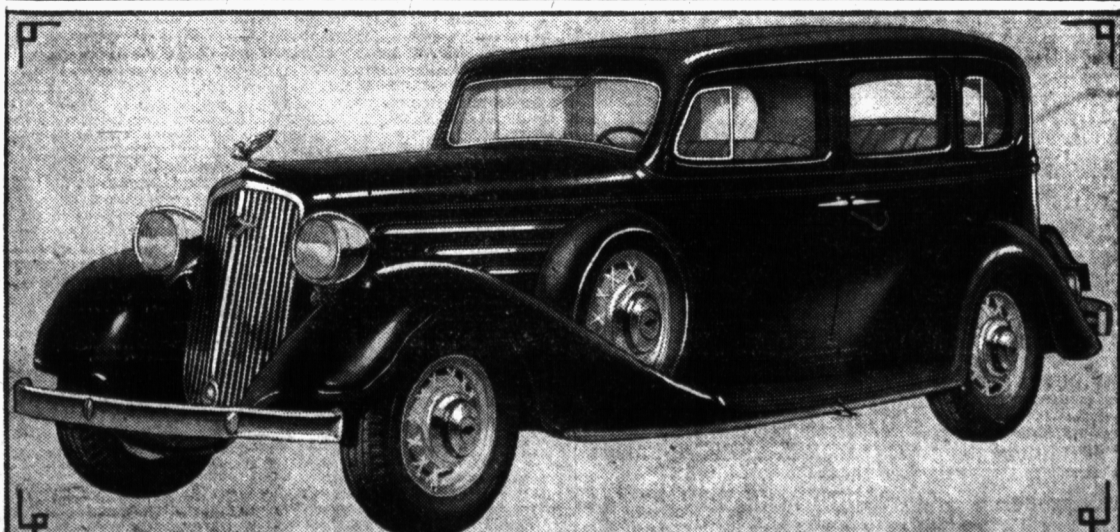

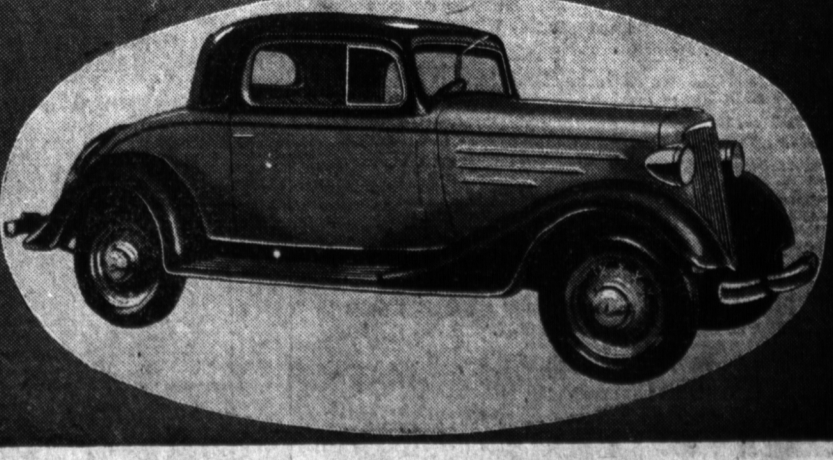
