ANNUAL MEETING F. & G. ASSOCIATION

The Report for the Year Submitted—The Old Board of Officers Re-elected—Change Proposed Regarding License for Residents' Sons

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Association was held last night in the Stipendiary's Courtroom, the president, F. W. Hyndman in the chair. At 8 o'clock the annual report of the Executive was submitted. It covered the work accomplished by the Association during the year and was in part as follows:—

In consequence of the absence of illegal fishing and shooting, the fish and game laws have been much more plentiful than has been known for a great many years. This is conceded by all. The local F. & G. clubs, at first violent opposers to the association, now see that they were laboring under a mistaken notion of its objects, and are no longer antagonistic, but show a disposition to work in harmony with us.

FRENCH SHORE QUESTION ANEW

French Vessel's Nets Destroyed, and British and French Warships Sent.

St. John's N. F., Sept. 7.—(Special)—The French shore question has been revived under a new aspect.

A French vessel fishing within the territorial waters on the north east coast destroyed her nets, British and French warships investigated and the Imperial Government invited the colony also to investigate and punish its subjects if found to be in the wrong.

The Colonial cruiser Flona with officials has been despatched to the scene to hold a full inquiry.

By a system of rigorous scrutiny into the records of those who appear on their visiting list, hostesses who have joined the reforming movements will weed out the men and women who bear the taint of the "Smart Set."

FRENCH SUNDAY LAW MAKING TROUBLE

Threat to Close Places of Amusement and Stop Cabs to Compel Legislative Reform—Hard to Make Operative the Provisions of the Law

PARIS, Sept. 6.—The law instituting a six day working week, passed by the French parliament last session, is threatening to be the cause of an endless amount of friction between workmen and employers.

According to the law, whenever possible the day of rest is to be Sunday, but in trades and professions where it is not possible for all the employers to rest that day another day of the week is to be chosen, or they are to rest in sections, a certain proportion each day.

This law was no sooner promulgated than trouble began, and strange to say, it gave no satisfaction either to employers or employees to decide to close on Sunday or for syndicate employees to declare in favor of Monday.

RACING IN RAIN AT ST JOHN

Gloria Won Free for All Breaking Record, Estell Boy Won 2.19.

St JOHN, Sept 7.—(Special)—Gloria Won the Free for All and the speedy little brown mare owned by W. J. Furbush 1st, Brown Mass, smashed the track record at Moosepath today, lowering Phoebeon W's mark of 2.17 1-4 to 2.16 flat.

Not only in one but every heat of the Free for All event the former record was broken the second and third heats being trotted in 2.17.

For several years the track record was 2.17 1-2 made by Nelson in an exhibition, mile, two of the finest races ever witnessed were pulled yesterday.

The day's sport was marred somewhat, however, by the rain, which began as the first heat of the Free for All was called and continued with a brief intermission all the afternoon.

Finally the track became so sticky that at the request of drivers and owners the 2.19 class in which Estell Boy had won two heats, Belfry Chimes one and Reta M. one, it was decided at the end of the fourth heat, and money awarded according to positions then held by horses, Estell Boy taking 1st money, Reta M. 2nd money, Belfry Chimes third money and Kremenella fourth money.

DR. COUSINS FREED BY THE GRAND JURY

The Indictment Appears to Have Been Maliciously Brought—The Dr. Goes Absolutely Free—Professional Rivals Blamed For Attempt to Ruin His Practice

Readers of The Guardian will doubtless remember that some months ago a paragraph appeared in the Boston papers stating that Dr. N. W. Cousins, of Waltham, Mass., a native of Pownal, was indicted for alleged assault upon a young woman named Murphy, who had called at his office.

The case aroused a great deal of interest, both in Waltham, where the doctor had resided for a number of years and where he numbered friends by the score, and here in his native province, where his relatives and acquaintances were fairly astounded that such a charge should be brought against one whom they would be the last to suspect of such a crime.

There were a number of people in Waltham who refused to consider the charge seriously. Chief among these was the doctor's wife, who made no secret of her belief that the charge was instigated by rival practitioners of Waltham, who were jealous of Dr. Cousins' success in the city of his adoption. GOOD RACING AT MOOSEPATH

St. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 7.—In spite of the inclemency of the weather nearly one thousand people yesterday afternoon witnessed some of the finest racing ever seen at the Moosepath race course. Dr. Band won the 2.15 class, and Burling, in three straight heats, was the winner of the 2.20 class.

In the 2.22 class, Belfry Chimes won in three straight heats.

The weather was too cold for speed, while the track was exceedingly heavy. In this race every heat was uncertain until the finish.

In the 2.15 class there only four starters in the first heat Lady Bingen was a winner stepping the distance in 2.24.

In the second heat, Lady Bingen broke and Will Be Sure pulled ahead into the lead, with Ada Mac second, Lady Bingen fourth.

The third heat resulted in Dr. Band coming in a winner, Lady Bingen second, Ada Mac third.

The fourth heat was Dr. Band's from start to finish. The fifth heat was won by Dr. Band, Lady Bingen second.

The racing in the 2.22 class was exceedingly fast. Belfry Chimes was the winner in three straight heats.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Sept. 7.—John D. Rockefeller will not appear before the bar of justice at Windup, Ohio.

While no statement has come directly from his lips to this effect, he has been advised that his presence there at the preliminary hearing on the action brought by Prosecutor David against the Standard Oil Company and himself will not be necessary. The Standard Oil Company's programme, it is understood, contemplates a motion to quash the state's information, which will have to be argued before the status of the case is determined and Mr. Rockefeller's presence desired.
