asked and what was the answer? The answer was the King Government was going to start in economizing and they were closing this office.

But their period of economy did not remain long in their mind for it was only a short time after until this office was opened, but by whom? A man from Nova Scotia—(Was there not a man in P. E. I. that could fill this office)—a man that had no interest in P. E. I. whatever. What is the result of this man's appointment? Under this economy Government first he received a raise in salary over his predecessor (for what)? How much of this raise that used to be done by our labour men is done on those Dredges since this Nova Scotia man was appointed Inspector of Dredges? The labour men can tell Mr. Sinclair if he doesn't know or can not tell us. This man that was formerly left here with the labour men—a portion of it found its way to Mr. Jenkins Store as well as the rest of the Grocery Stores.) Will they deny this? Do they get any of it today? No, this work is all done over in Nova Scotia by Nova Scotia labour and paid out of the estimates that are charged up to the Province to the account of the Dredging Department. This is one of the great things that Mr. Sinclair and Mr. Jenkins are asking the electors to vote for them for to economize in the money that was going into the pockets of our labour men. Something for them to be proud of. Why was Capt. Belyea of Tug Rena dismissed (one of the best Tug Captains in the Maritime Provinces)? Surely that was not on account of economy. The man that got the appointment, has not saved the Government much money by reports, but we are told that Mr. Sinclair says that this appointment was done over his head and he knew nothing about it. Probably the Inspector of Dredges got his appointment over his head also. One can search the fashionable shops and scan the smartest of sport costumes without finding anything more alluring than the simple cardigan, descendant of the warm knitted jacket worn by men years ago. This garment owes much of its popularity to its snugness of fit. For this reason it is popular for out-of-door wear on the golf links or tramping, in the early autumn days when there is the suspicion of a chill in the brilliant. The cardigan is also liked by the business girl to wear in the office, and it is liked by everyone to wear under a coat in the winter. It can be knit in a plain stocking stitch and left at that, or one can procure a chart with a design to be worked in colored wools in cross stitch, usually on the front and the sleeve, leaving the back plain. To decorate it in this way is much more simple than by knitting the design. Another style of the same type of coat which you may call a jumper if you like it better, has the same flat finish to the neck and tight fitting sleeves, but is knitted in a fancy stitch to within a few inches of the bottom, when the knitter reverts to a plain stitch, on which is worked a border of lovers' knots in cross stitch in two shades of wool.

Have you seen the new curly wool? When knitted into cap or coat it looks just like a fine curly grey lamb. This wool makes very pretty turtle neck coats, and also those with high neck, open a few inches over the breast, because with these high neck things we wear now, there really must be an opening somewhere to let 'em in. The body of one very pretty example was knit of coral color yarn with collar, cuffs and a border around the bottom in black and white block design. The cap that goes with this coat is knit in the border colors and design. There are many types of hats, and of course they are interchangeable, one likes a close fitting cap, another a Tan 'O Shanter and another one of those pretty, rolling brim styles. Any of them can be knitted of this year.
