WORLD'S WHEAT CROP.

Small Shortage Compared With the Yield of Last Year.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Official statistics of the wheat crop of the world for 1900 (1901) have just been compiled by the Department of Agriculture.

They show that in the countries of the Southern Hemisphere, whose figures are commonly included in such statements, the production will be about 180,543,000 bushels. This is only 10,000,000 short of last year's total. Australia and Chili are the only countries showing any material reductions.

The crop in Argentine is believed to be about 105,000,000 bushels, nearly equalling last year's large figures.

Notwithstanding the Indian famine the 1900 wheat crop in Bengal, Northwest Provinces and Oudh and the Punjab is above the average. Elsewhere it has been a failure. The Indian wheat crop as a whole is 182,582,000 bushels, against 236,679,000 bushels in 1899.

The Russian crop is rather below the average. More than an average is indicated for Central Sweden. In Germany somewhat above an average yield is indicated. The Austrian crop is rather poor in some districts. The last figures received put the Hungarian crop at 135,000,000 bushels. Roumanian reports are favorable, but the total area is somewhat reduced. The Bulgarian crop is reported unusually good.

About an average crop is indicated in Italy, Switzerland and Spain; in France, slightly above the average. Favorable reports come from Belgium and the Netherlands. A deficiency of 9,500,000 Winchester bushels is indicated for Great Britain.
