World-Wide Lumber Drive To Be Launched

VICTORIA, June 7.—(By The Canadian Press)—Barred out of the United States by the new tariff law, the British Columbia lumber industry is about to launch a world wide drive for new markets. In co-operation with the British Columbia Government, lumbermen are planning a campaign for business in China, Japan, South Africa and every country which buys lumber in any quantity.

Meetings to organize this campaign will be held during the next few days and will be attended by Hon. N. S. Loughheed, Minister of Lands, representing the Government.

One of the first steps, it is expected, will be an effort to secure a Dominion Shipping subsidy on exported lumber. This is desired to put British Columbia lumber in as good a position in world competition as American lumber, which enjoys a subsidy of \$4 per thousand feet. A similar subsidy for the Canadian product is proposed.

Freed Then Re Arrested

NEW YORK, June 7.—(A.P.)—Fritz Joubert Duquesne, who was arrested recently as a fugitive from justice and the alleged murderer of three British seamen, was freed from the extradition charge in United States Federal Court today.

This action was taken when the court was informed that the British Government did not oppose a writ of Habeas Corpus sued out by Arthur Garfield Hays, Counsel for the American Civil Liberties Union. Duquesne, who is also known as Frederick De Trafford Craven, was immediately rearrested on a charge of being an escaped prisoner.

The murder charge against him relates to the death of seamen who were killed in the explosion of the steamer Tennyson in 1916.
