A FINAL MESSAGE FROM PREMIER STEWART

To the Electors of the Province of Prince Edward Island,—

You are now nearing what is probably the most important political contest in the history of this Province. On Saturday you will by your votes decide whether you wish to retain a Government which has reduced taxation or to reinstate a Government with a record for increasing taxation; to retain in power a Government which has kept the promises upon which it was elected or to reinstate a Government with a record for flagrant violation of every pre-election promise; whether you wish to keep in power a Government that has succeeded in obtaining from the Federal Government by way of an increased subsidy the largest single amount ever obtained from that source,—or to reinstate in power a Government that in the face of a pre-election promise made no effort whatever during its four years' term of office to obtain such increase in revenue.

As the present Government goes to the country there is absolutely no fair or successful criticism of its record or administration. Perhaps the chief fighting ground lies around the proposed temperance policy of the present Government. You will have to decide whether you wish to retain the present Prohibition Law which has been found impossible of enforcement, not only in this Province but in every other Province in Canada, whether the enforcement has been in the hands of an independent commission or in the hands of a Provincial Department of Justice; a law under which there has grown up evils unheard of before and which if allowed to continue and to increase will undoubtedly jeopardize the future of our Province; a law which is not enforceable because it has not behind it the great weight of public opinion.

Or whether you wish to follow the example of our great sister Provinces and adopt a law which will have behind it the weight of public opinion; a law framed to deal in a practical way with conditions as they exist rather than to embody in a statute an ideal impossible of present attainment.

The Government asks you when going to the polls on this occasion to look at its record of business administration and its record of reduced taxation upon the people of the Province, and at its record of pre-election promises fulfilled. It asks you to eliminate from your minds mis-statements, misrepresentations, slanderous and untruthful propaganda which has been aimed at it throughout this campaign, and to trust this Government which has kept its promises to you to date, to deal with this troublesome problem of Temperance legislation and enforcement in the same manner which it has dealt with other governmental matters entrusted to it in the past so as to produce the results which all good citizens of our beloved Province expect and look for.

POLITICAL MEETING AT ST. ELEANORS

Conservative Candidates Score Success In Liberal District—Feature Of The Meeting Was Magnificent Speech Of Hon. A. F. Arsenault.

The political meeting at St. Eleanors on Tuesday night was the most recent Liberal being captivated by his masterly discourse.

Mr. L.R. Allan was the first speaker and thanked the people in advance for their anticipated support on Election Day. He said that the \$125,000 received from Ottawa was entirely a federal matter over which we as a province had very little to do. He said the Liberal Government at Ottawa today are backing up the Mackenzie King Government when anything comes up for the benefit of the Maritime provinces. We are just on the verge of prosperity and should have a local government in line with the federal government. We have heard a lot about Premier Stewart preparing a brief, said Mr. Allan, well known to the people of this province who could have prepared that brief for the premier of the province did not. With regard to the Railway grant of \$40,000 Mr. Allan contended that Premier Stewart was not entitled to any credit as it was thrust upon us and we could not refuse it.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 22.—John C. Miles, Sydney Mines, N. S., won the ten mile race run on the Wanderers track here tonight as part of the natal day celebrations postponed from yesterday on account of wet weather. Miles' time was 53:32.5.

Charles Snell of Toronto led the field for the first fifteen laps with Miles close at his heels, then Miles took the lead and ran twenty laps with Snell never more than a yard behind. After the 36th lap of the quarter miles track Miles lengthened his stride and opened a gap between him and the Toronto runner which was never filled. Snell seemed unable to quicken his pace and was nearly a lap behind when Miles finished.

Silas McLellan of Noel, Hants Co., N. S., was third several laps behind the winner.

Premier Stewart's Temperance Act Best Of Its Kind In The Whole Of Canada

IS THE OPINION OF WELL-KNOWN PROHIBITION LEADERS

Certain well-known Prohibition leaders in the Maritime Provinces after making a careful study of the principles of Premier Stewart's proposed Temperance Act declared that from the standpoint of a liquor control act it is the best of its kind in the Dominion of Canada.

One of these men declared himself in the following manner: "While I am a Prohibitionist—brought up after the strictest sort—and while nothing short of Prohibition—in the strictest sense—would satisfy me, I must confess that after a careful examination of the principles of the proposed Stewart Act, I am free to state that in my opinion it is the safest, the strictest and the most human Act in Canada today.

HUMAN, I say, because it is manifestly intended in this Act—to safeguard the home to the fullest extent to which an Act of this sort can go.

"I believe Premier Stewart will push as far as possible every means within his power to make the Act an instrument that will cut in every direction; an Act that will not be merely a symbol of law but a real living force to protect the liberties of the Island citizens, and to punish to the utmost limits of the law all who dare tramp upon the rights and privileges of British subjects. So far as these great virtues and powers can be operated under a Control Act, I believe Premier Stewart has worked out a real achievement in a Liquor Control Act."
