NOT SORRY FOR CRIME.

Physicians Say his Brain was Normal if Not Above Ordinary.

CZOLGOSZ ELECTROCUTED.

AUBURN, Oct. 29.—(Special)—Leon F. Czolgosz was electrocuted at 7.30 this morning.

He slept soundly last night and this morning asked the Superintendent's permission to make a statement in presence of a lot of people.

WHY HE KILLED MCKIN

CZOLGOSZ' LAST WORDS.

LIBERALS CONVENE

For the Purpose of Select- ing a Candidate

OPINIONS EXPRESSED

Resolutions Passed and a Representative Chosen.

The Liberal convention for West Queen's was very largely attended yesterday afternoon. Mr. B. Rogers presided and Mr. J. F. Whear acted as secretary.

Before proceeding to spread the ballot Mr. F. H. Beer moved that decision of the convention be unanimous and that the delegates all pledge themselves to make it unanimous. In moving this he looked back with regret upon the proceedings of the past three months. He condemned the course pursued by newspapers and the holding of meetings before this date. He contended if the electors were not competent to judge the sooner they were the better.

Mr. W. F. Tidmarsh said he came to the convention to vote for whom he pleased. He did not see why such a resolution should be introduced. Hon. John Balderson and Jas. McLean spoke in favor of the resolution. Mr. Rattenbury contended however that the introduction of such a resolution at this stage was out of place.

Mr. Haszard, just as the Chairman was about to put the motion, on rising said he regretted that he could not see his way clear to be bound by a convention composed as it is to-day. He had upon the platform and upon different occasions offered to sign an agreement with Mr. Farquharson but this he did not consent to do until such time as he had the convention fixed up to suit himself. He strongly objected to the methods used at some of the polling divisions to elect delegates to this convention, sufficient time not having been given to the electors. He also referred to other irregularities. At one poll in particular he understood no notice was given until the afternoon and night of meeting. Ever then a gentleman went out from Charlottetown and acted as Chairman. The hall was not opened and a few got the key of the church and held a meeting. He had acted fairly in the matter and he demanded fair play all around. He complained of his treatment at the hands of certain gentlemen and also very strongly condemned the part the Patriot had taken throughout the campaign. He was sure that the action of the latter would be disapproved.

Mr. Farquharson regretted that Mr. Haszard had made the speech of today. He could not think of a convention more peace able than today's. Mr. Haszard in his presence at Clifton had agreed to abide by a convention. He then reviewed some of the complaints made by Mr. Haszard and said that in the cases of New Haven and Nine Mile Creek he had investigated the matter and had asked that other meetings be called. He thought Mr. Haszard should submit his case to the convention.

Mr. J. F. Whear followed supporting Mr. Farquharson.

Mr. Haszard's nomination was moved by William Whitehead, Clifton, seconded by Peter P. McGuigan, Hope River.

Premier Farquharson's nomination was moved by Hon. John Balderson, North Wiltshire, seconded by William Howard, North River. The ballot resulted in 116 for Farquharson and 23 for Haszard.

It was moved by Mr. J. F. Whear, seconded by Mr. James McLean that nomination be made unanimous. Mr. Haszard's friends having left the hall, the motion was declared by the chairman as carried unanimously.

The chairman then tendered the nomination to Mr. Farquharson who made a short reply. He said he was running against a very good man. He did not consider himself a better man but he was simply asking for justice. He thought Mr. Haszard had too much good sense to stand up in view of the voice of the convention. He then called upon Mr. Haszard to state his grievance and if there is any trouble "let us heal it up." This is the day of the Conservatives' harvest. If Mr. Haszard would state his grievance he would go more than half way to meet it.

TERRIBLE RACE RIOT

One White and Nine Blacks Killed

TWO WOMEN AND CHILD

Were Burned—A Colored Parson Among the Slaughtered Victims.

RACE RIOT IN LOUISIANA.

COLUMBIA, Miss., Oct. 29.—(Special)—Great excitement prevails over stories from Balltown, La., of a riot between whites and blacks as a result of the shooting and burning Ball Morris a negro who assaulted and almost murdered Mrs. John Ball.

ONE WHITE AND NINE BLACKS KILLED.

The Sheriff and a posse of men were sent out to arrest Crea Lott, colored running an illegal bar at a colored revival. They were ambushed by the blacks and offered resistance.

One of the posse was killed and another wounded and five negro men and three women killed.

WOMEN BURNED—BLACK PARSON KILLED. The two latter were burned, one with her child in Lott's restaurant.

A number of negroes were wounded and one of those killed was a colored parson.

SMALLPOX ENDS TRIAL.

The referee trial in the case of William R. Cahon and William H. Moore against Laura D. Lockwood in the Levy Court at Dover, Del., Wednesday, came to a sudden end when it was announced the defendant was just recovering from an attack of smallpox. The room suddenly became empty. This was just after Mrs. Lockwood had testified. Decision was rendered in favor of the defendant.
