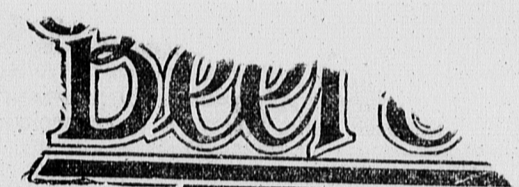
HOCKEY
