

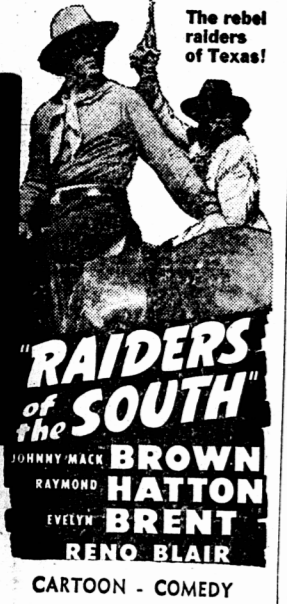

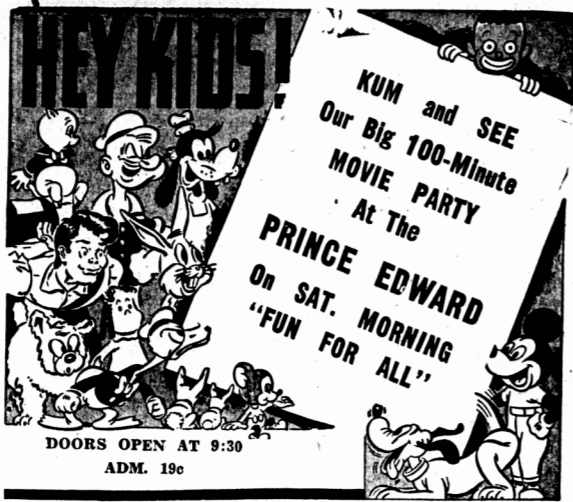

MAY TRY SMALL SCALE URANIUM PRODUCTION WELLINGTON, N.Z., Oct. 30 - (CP) - Investigations into the possibility of producing uranium in New Zealand have been made in recent months by the department of scientific and industrial research in co-operation with gold-dredging companies operating on the west coast of the South Island. The research indicates that small-scale production could be undertaken if necessary.

However, in order to effect complete recovery of uranium by means of the gold dredges their output of gold would have to be reduced and officers of the department have been sent abroad to study methods of separation from dredge tailings and certain sands with a view to evolving a more efficient method of production for New Zealand conditions.

Ontario House Resumes Session (By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, Oct. 27 - The Ontario Legislature today gave second reading to a bill regulating milk distribution and introduced legislation to prevent improper removal of business records from Ontario.

Opposition members criticized the milk legislation on grounds it was inadequate and likely to lead to milk price wars but the vote on the second reading carried 43 to 21.

The business records bill stemmed from the issuing of United States subpoenas last March against more than 50 Canadian pulp and paper companies which export newsprint to the United States. The subpoenas were issued under the anti-trust laws of the United States. Similar subpoenas also were issued against the officers of these companies.

"I am introducing a bill which makes it a legal offence to comply with any requirement of a judicial authority outside of Ontario which would cause to be removed from this province to a point outside of Ontario any of the essential records of business being carried on in this Province," said Premier Drew as he introduced the bill for first reading.

"It further provides that if the Attorney-General or any person having an interest in a business so affected, has reason to believe that such a requirement has been made or is likely to be made, proceedings may be taken before the Supreme Court of Ontario to insure that such records will not be removed.

"While this bill is directed to the particular situation arising from the subpoena served upon Canadian newspaper companies and their officials, it will also be effective if at any time in the future other improper proceedings of the same nature should be instituted by any administrative authority outside of Ontario."

No such protection previously had existed because at no time in the past had any such extra-territorial authority been asserted. It would appear that no Government anticipated the possibility that such an improper proceeding ever would be undertaken.

"I hope that the Government of the United States will see fit to withdraw these proceedings and follow the course which is in keeping with that close international friendship which has been an example to the whole world," the Premier said.

DAY TRIPPERS POSE BRIGHTON PROBLEM BRIGHTON, England, Oct. 30 - (CP) - Brighton, which proudly calls itself the "queen" of British seaside resorts, is embarrassed by the post-war popularity which floods it on summer week-ends and holidays with "day trippers"-visitors who run down from London for the day and spend little in the town.

The problem has been given added urgency by a current movement for amalgamation with the neighboring towns of Hove, Portslade, Southwick and Shoreham, all of which claim they don't want day trippers.

"An amalgamation of Brighton and Hove would give much wider scope to enable the borough council to cater for all classes of visitors," said A. E. Orbell, president of the Brighton and Hove Chamber of Commerce and Trade.

"It's ridiculous to suggest that Brighton, only an hour's journey from London, should welcome only week-end or longer term visitors. But we must have a sense of proportion and maintain the broad principle of encouraging trippers as far as possible to go to the eastern end of the sea front."
