Turkish Girls Study Public Health Method

TORONTO, Dec. 21.—Two representatives of modern Turkey, registered nurses, are acquiring information at the University of Toronto this winter on nursing methods and public health administration. Later they will apply their new knowledge as instructress in the subjects in their home country. They are Miss Fatma Abdurrahman and Miss Ulfet Ahmet.

Having completed two and one-half years of nursing training in Turkey, they were chosen by the Ministry of Health for travel by and study on this continent. They spent a year and a half in the Orange Memorial Hospital in New Jersey, under the auspices of the Rockefeller Foundation. Then the Foundation selected the Department of Public Health Nursing of the University of Toronto for their further training. They will spend next spring here, returning shortly afterwards to teach in Turkey.

"Our students at home are much like our classmates here," they find. "Even Toronto is not so different from our Istanbul. We have our movies and our electric signs. We find a few customs different here, but many are the same as ours."

Love Would Not Come To Poet

LONDON, Dec. 21.—(C.P.)—Dr. Greville MacDonald's book, just out, "Reminiscences of a Specialist" (Allen and Unwin) says that when John Ruskin was asked by Dr. MacDonald's father—George MacDonald—why he did not defend himself in the famous divorce case, he said:

"Do you think, if she wanted to be rid of me, I would put any obstacle in her way? I never loved Euphie before I married her, but I hoped I might and ought to, if only for her beauty." Then he proceeded to explain his deplorable foolishness, how, over-persuaded by his parents, he proposed to a girl whom he only admired. Curiously enough, he presumed that the necessary love would follow marriage, as he had been assured it would. But he was not the man to claim intimate relations, to him most sacred, without the only justification for them, namely that of loving beyond anything in heaven or earth.

Dr. MacDonald also throws new light on the story of Ruskin's love for Rose la Touche, whom he first met when he was 39 and she only nine years old. He declares that Rose ultimately refused to marry him because of false and malicious stories about his private life.

CO-DISCOVERER TO USE CANADIAN RADIUM

PARIS, Dec. 21.—Madame Pierre Curie, co-discoverer with her husband of radium, will use Canadian radium on her researches, it was announced today.

Madame Curie has been handicapped in her work recently by inadequate supplies of the metal, known chiefly for its curative properties toward cancer.

Arrangements whereby she will receive supplies of Canadian radium were made with Major Bernard Day, representative of Canadian radium interests who has been visiting in Europe, the announcement said.

To Safeguard Head Teachers

LONDON, Dec. 21.—(C.P.)—The London Head Teachers' Association has passed resolutions opposing several of the recommendations on education of the Ray Economy Committee. The Association views with alarm the threat to the position of head teachers implied in the recommendations that small schools should be closed or amalgamated, and demands that wherever such action may be taken the status of the head-teachers shall be safeguarded. It reaffirms its policy that head-teachers of schools of 100 children or more should be free from whole-time teaching, and protests against the suggestion that in the first 10 years of service teachers' increments should be biennial instead of annual.

IS GOOD HUNTER ALTHOUGH BLIND

BELLEVILLE, Ont., Dec. 21.—Doomed to blindness by a sniper's bullet during the Great War, Archie Meeks, Bon Echo, has acquired the title of the "blind hunter from Bon Echo." Meeks, although totally blinded by a war wound, has developed such a keen sense of hearing he is able to shoot most accurately at a moving object.

No Practical Method Discovered

MONTREAL, Dec. 21.—(C.P.)—Physicians know all about the theory of sex determination, but no practical method of application has yet been developed. This opinion was expressed by one of the world's most eminent biologists, Dr. Richard Goldschmidt, director of the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute of Biology in Berlin, who delivered the annual Somerville Lecture at McGill University.

Dr. Goldschmidt is a great connoisseur of Chinese art, of which he has an extensive collection. This hobby, as he calls his love of the Oriental, brought him to Canada several years ago, when he made an examination of a remarkably fine collection of old Chinese art-ware in the Ontario Museum at Toronto; "one of the largest and finest collections in the world," he said.

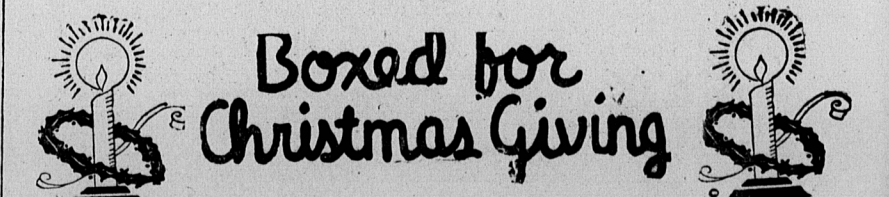

Budapest Palace To Be Sold

One of the finest feudal mansions in Budapest, formerly the residence of Count Michael Karolyi, the "Red Count" who was President of the "People's Republic" in 1919, is to be sold by auction.

Count Michael fled from Hungary, his property was confiscated and the palace became the property of the municipality.

The palace contains a very valuable library, pictures and tapestries, mirrors, and some Venetian chandeliers of great beauty, as well as historical relics. A full inventory has been taken in preparation for the auction.

The great park which surrounds the palace was thrown open to the public some time ago.
