PARASITES IN SWINE (Experimental Farms Note.) Is there any problem at this time which deserves more careful study and attention in swine husbandry than does the question of parasites? It makes no difference what type of you raise, if you are feeding, besides the hog, numerous parasites, such as intestinal round worms (ascarids), lung worms, etc., your profits are diminished materially. More than that, the parasite weakens the vital organs of the digestive system on other organs of the body so that the hogs are unable to utilize their feed to the best advantage and they become a liability instead of an asset to the farmer.

At the Dominion Experimental Station, Rothern, Saskatchewan, detailed records regarding the health of numerous litters have been kept from birth to marketing weight (200 pounds). From these records it appears that the critical period of a pig's life is from the fourth to the twelfth week, the time when they are nursing the sow, and the first four weeks after weaning.

Symptoms indicating the presence of parasites appeared to develop gradually, the first indication being slight scouring followed by coughing and sluggishness, with no strong desire for nursing. In litters where these symptoms were very pronounced there was, as a rule, a very high percentage of mortality and in practically every case the entire litter showed similar symptoms. The litters which showed none of these symptoms appeared very active from the fourth to the twelfth week. The pigs which survived in litters which appeared to be affected with parasites were slaughtered on reaching 200 pounds in weight and an examination made at the abattoir by a qualified veterinary surgeon. In practically every case ascarids were found, varying in number from one to one hundred and fifty-three in one pig. The hog which had one hundred and fifty-three ascarids was marketed on the 23rd day after birth, whereas pigs from litters which showed no trace of ascarids were marketed at the 17th to the 26th day after birth. The amount of meal required per 100 pounds gain was materially increased in the litters which showed the presence of parasites.

Preventive measures against parasites cannot be emphasized too strongly, some of which are sanitation, which includes disinfecting of pens previous to farrowing, and from farrowing time on, giving a recommended vermifuge to the sow two or three days previous to farrowing and disinfecting with creolin. Last but not least, the pigs should not be allowed to run on the same land year after year. On the average farm the sows and litters can be kept on new land nearly every year. This will assist in keeping the pigs free from parasites, thus retaining their health and vigor and increasing the farmer's net income from his hogs. Prevention is undoubtedly better than cure in the case of parasites.

Fish Flakes

Excellent for the emergency shelf for summer days is the inexpensive canned fish flakes. You can cream them, make salad of them, or use with bits of mushroom, watercress or pimento for unusual omelets. DETECTIVE

Upon doing all of these things then such declaration has the same force and effect and subjects the person making it to the like consequences as if such person had kissed the Book in the manner now obtaining.

This then is the statutory form that can be substituted for the Common Law form ordinarily used. I take it that the provisions of the Statute must be followed not in part but in whole. A witness cannot follow part of the provisions of the Statute and not the rest.

It was contended that the alleged oath taken by the witness in this case was the Scotch oath which is allowed in certain places. But even in the Scotch oath an essential part is that the witness repeat the words of the oath which the witness in this case did not do and so did not bring himself within the provisions of the Statute nor did the alleged oath even constitute a Scotch oath.

The case of the King vs. Curry, 48 Can. Supreme Court, 532, was cited before me as a case in point. In that case the witness was sworn in very much the same way as the witness in the present case and the question for consideration was whether he could be convicted of perjury and it was held that he could.

I have no doubt that in the present case the witness Hague could on the form of the oath he took be indicted for perjury, but there is a marked difference between that and the consideration as to whether the liberty of a subject can be taken away by the taking of an oath which does not conform to either the Common Law or statutory form, and in this respect I agree with Russell, J., in the above case where he says:

"If the question were to arise between the Crown and a prisoner convicted on the evidence of a witness sworn in the manner in which the defendant in this case was sworn there might be good reason for quashing the conviction, or if a verdict was found on the evidence of a witness thus irregularly sworn there might be good reason for ordering a new trial. It could be reasonably argued that the prisoner found guilty, or the unsuccessful party in the civil suit, had a right to the protection which would be afforded to him by having the witness sworn in the manner most binding upon his conscience, and that this protection was not secured to him if the accustomed and regular form was departed from without the proper preliminary question being asked and answered. But it surely ought to be a different question altogether when the witness whose statements have misled the court is himself on trial for having borne false witness against his neighbor. It seems to me the extreme of drollery that the witness who has consented to be sworn in a particular manner without objection and whose false statements have inflicted injury upon his fellow-man should be allowed to come before a court of justice and claim immunity from punishment because he was not sworn in such a way as to bind his conscience, for that is exactly what his contention really amounts to. It is no adequate answer to all this to say that no harm has been done by the action of the witness in the case supposed, because the conviction will be quashed or the verdict set aside. The mischief has been done, the court has been misled, the prisoner suffered an unjust imprisonment even though it may have been afterwards adjudged illegal, and in the case before us I assume that the Commissioner has reported in accordance with the testimony which the decision of the County Court has pronounced to be perjury."

The Legislature of this Province has seen fit to provide by a statutory enactment an alternative form of taking the oath in all courts of this Province and has prescribed the form of taking such oath. The form cannot be varied at the whim of the witness for if he varies the form who can tell what his intention is in so doing. He may or may not consider such variation binding on his conscience. The person whose liberty is at stake has a right to be protected against anything that might be prejudicial to his case and such a variation of the prescribed oath might make all the difference between the witness telling the truth or telling a lie.

In the circumstances the prisoner will be discharged but on the terms that no action shall be brought by him in consequence of his prosecution or imprisonment.
