CREW OF RIVER STEAMER HAD A NARROW ESCAPE. GAGETOWN, N. B., Aug. 14.—Captain Donald Williams and the crew of the steamer Albatross, a vessel once seized for smuggling, barely escaped with their lives when the craft was burned to the water's edge and sank in the St. John River at Beesley's Point. The steamer was coming down the river towing a raft of lumber and after leaving Gagetown tied up at Beesley's Point to wait for daylight. The Captain and crew were asleep when the Captain was awakened by thick smoke from the engine room filling his cabin. He fought his way through to the deck and after arousing the crew, all hands were able to escape, all suffering from inhaling smoke. The steamer was owned by Robert C. Henderson of St. John. She has had a chequered career. She was built as a steam yacht and was owned in Boston. Later she engaged in smuggling operations and was seized by the Canadian Government which used her in St. John harbor as a customs revenue boat for a time.

AMERICAN CONCERNS BUILD BRANCHES IN DOMINION. WASHINGTON, August 14.—The establishment of branch factories in Canada, by the United States manufacturers is regarded as one of the most striking developments in the trade of the Dominion according to a report received from Winnipeg. One industrial commissioner in Canada claims to have been in contact with one hundred American firms anxious to locate on the Canadian side. Firms manufacturing chemicals, motor cars, toilet preparations, metal and wood-working tools and many other commodities made the inquiries. It is reported that two hundred firms from this country established branches in Canada during the year either by erecting or leasing plants.
