METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Some Interesting Notes of the Session by a Guardian Correspondent.

MONCTON, June 23.—The Conference opened at 9 o'clock. The opening services this year have been of more than usual interest, by the introduction of a short address each morning by one of the ministers. All of them have proved most stimulating and not the least so was the deliverance of Rev. John Read, D. D., this morning, on the subject of consecration to the Master's service. Dr. Read has not lost any of his freshness, fire and force in public address. His utterances were most helpful and much appreciated. The Conference then resumed its business.

Rev. John Goldsmith presented the report of the Sustentation Fund, from which it appeared that the Society received \$2,235.92, and after the payment of expenses disbursed among the missions \$2110. The amount raised is less than last year owing to the loss of a large subscription from one of our city churches through the decease of the donor. Otherwise the Fund gives evidence of substantial increase yearly.

Rev. G. F. Dawson submitted the membership report. It showed that the total number of members received into the church during the past year was 1,220. The full membership of the church is 13,330; on trial, 308; full membership at present time, 13,638; full membership at last conference, 13,668, a net decrease of 30; number of infant baptisms, 857; adult, 118, or 975 altogether; marriages, 374; burials, 673.

At a ministerial session on Wednesday five candidates passed successfully examinations for the ministry: They are: H. E. Thomas, H. E. Price, George A. Ross, W. R. McDonald and A. Campbell. All first, second and third year candidates also passed and were recommended to be continued on trial.

Rev. H. R. Baker presented the church property report, which on motion was adopted. Permission was asked by the Winsloe Circuit to sell the Rustico Road Church, the proceeds of which it is proposed to expend upon the parsonage. After considerable discussion the report was adopted and permission granted.

Rev. T. A. Whitman read the report of the Temperance Committee. It contained the following resolution, in favor of Prohibitory legislation.

Whereas intemperance is one of the greatest evils which infests the social and political life of this country, and is the greatest barrier to the progress of the Kingdom of Christ and the work of his Church and

Whereas the attitude of the Methodist church has ever been one of uncompromising hostility to the liquor traffic, and

Whereas the cultivation of public sentiment and the efficiency of legal reform are only gained by constant effort.

Therefore be it Resolved, that this Conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island is of the opinion that the entire prohibition of the importation, sale, and manufacture of intoxicating liquor is the only satisfactory solution of this question, and is the ultimate goal towards which all efforts should be directed.

Be it further Resolved, that as a means to this end, we would strongly recommend and urge upon the Federal Government, that the right to prohibit, the importation sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors be accorded to the Provinces that have expressed themselves favorable to such legislation, and

Be it further Resolved, that the Conference heartily approve of the action of the Government of Prince Edward Island in having passed an Act, prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor in the Province, and also that the Conference congratulate them on being the first Province in the Dominion of Canada in securing the largest possible measure of Provincial Prohibition, and also, that we are pleased to note that other Provinces are moving in this important direction.

Be it further Resolved that this Conference recognize and most heartily commend the efforts of the Dominion alliance for the suppression of this great evil, and in compliance with their request, would appoint the Revs. Wm. Penna, G. W. Fisher, W. W. H. Sprague and Jas. Crisp as representatives from this Conference on the alliance Council.

Be it further Resolved that the Conference requests its ministers, to bring before their congregations, the disciplinary requirements and to preach sermons in the interest of the cause of temperance. The foregoing resolutions led to a prolonged debate, which was not terminated.

at the hour of adjournment. The second clause of the resolution gave rise to much discussion, on such points as the power of the Federal Government to confer rights on Provinces to pass prohibitory laws; the value of such legislation which only prohibits the sale, but allows the importation of liquor; and the expediency of the temperance people accepting Provincial Prohibition as a substitute for entire prohibition throughout the Dominion, which some speakers declared had been promised by the Government. Judging from the speeches delivered there was great variety of opinion as to the best methods of suppressing the liquor traffic, but decided unanimity upon one point, namely that the business must be driven out and as quickly as possible.
