Great Britain. For October 1931 the figure was 104.4 and in November, 106.4. Since that time the index figure has moved closer to the 100 mark, and in the month of October 1932 it stood at 101.1, November 101.1, and in December, the last month for which figures are available, it was 101. Comparing that figure, therefore, with the index as in September 1931, it will be noted that there is actually a slight increase in wholesale prices in Great Britain.

"If prompt action had not been taken by our Government in September 1931 to continue to value the pound sterling for customs purposes at \$4.86 2-3, the net result would have been that the tariff against Great Britain up to about 20 per cent would have been wiped out, and in some cases indeed the British exporters to Canada would, owing to the exchange, be receiving a bonus.

"Action could perhaps have been taken by way of special surtax or quota system as has been done by other countries who were faced with unfair competition from countries whose currency has become depreciated, but we adopted the more moderate course of endeavoring to maintain so far as was possible the status quo, with this slight exception that having regard to the fact that there has been an increase in commodity prices in Great Britain variously estimated by experts at the time at anywhere from seven percent to 10 per cent, we decided that although regular duty would be assessed on the basis of \$4.86 2-3 to the pound sterling, special or exchange dumping duty would only be collected on a basis of \$4.40 to the pound sterling, which represents a discount of 10 percent from the par value.

"Since that time representations have been made to me both to increase and to lower the figure of \$4.40, but everything considered

DEBATE ENDED IN HOUSE ON DRAFT ADDRESS

The debate on the Draft Address was concluded in the Legislature yesterday at 5:20 p. m., the speakers yesterday being Mr. Thane A. Campbell (Lib. First Prince), Hon. G. Shelton Sharp, Minister of Public Works, and Mr. W. H. Dennis (Lib. Second Prince).

The House met at 3:30 p. m. First reading was given to "An Act to Provide for the transfer of the duties of the Prince Edward Island Provincial Police to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police;" "An Act to Amend the Amusement Tax Act;" an act to incorporate the O'Leary Athletic Association, Ltd., and an Act to empower Barclay's Trust Company of Canada to do business in Canada.

Following the conclusion of the Draft Address debate, the Public Accounts and report of the Provincial Health Department were tabled.

The House, on motion of Hon. Dr. MacMillan, went into committee on The Public Vehicle Act with Mr. Strong in the chair. The act provides for the collection of a license from persons conducting on the highway the business of a public carrier of passengers, or passengers and express freight. There was considerable discussion by Messrs. Lea, T. A. Campbell, H. H. Cox, Hon. Dr. MacMillan, Hon. Mr. Arsenault, Hon. Mr. McPhee and others. At 6 p. m. progress was reported, and the House adjourned until 3 o'clock this afternoon.

TORONTO, March 7.—(By The Canadian Press)—Chiff Manahan's Edmonton Royals, Alberta's bidder for the 1933 curling championship of Canada had the lead all to themselves tonight after first day's play for the MacDonald Brier trophy here. The Albertans took a lead by winning two straight games while rinks from Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Ontario, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia won and lost.

The Manahan quartette, consistently brilliant during the day, helped the west to score a sweeping triumph in the morning by outpointing New Brunswick's entry, led by J. S. Malcolm of Saint John, 14-11, then turned on the powerful Jerry Abrams rink from Northern Ontario in the afternoon for a 13-10 victory.

He could write with authority on several branches of sport, notably harness racing and his was a familiar figure at all the important race meets on the Island. Possessed of an engaging personality those of us who knew "Tec" feel a distinct personal loss and we extend our sincere sympathy to his bereaved ones. Death has cut short a promising career and Maritime sport has sustained a distinct loss.—Moncton Times.

Maritime sportsdom was shocked yesterday to learn of the sudden passing of Thomas E. Corrigan, sport editor of the Charlottetown Guardian. Known to all sport writers and hundreds of followers of all branches of sport, "Tec" was highly esteemed and he will be missed. Tension Relaxes In Bank Crisis

Second Day Of Bank Holiday Sees Banks Loosening Purse Strings In Larger Centres.

(By Claude A. Jagger, Associated Press Financial Editor) NEW YORK, March 7.—(A.P.)—With banks loosening their purse strings a little in most of larger financial centres of the United States today, tension relaxed somewhat on the second day of the Nation's bank holiday. Considerable confusion existed among banks in New York, Chicago, and other cities, as to the immediate procedure which should be followed in availing themselves of Secretary of the Treasury Woodin's rulings allowing them to resume restricted banking activity, to permit cashing of payroll cheques and

financing the movement of food-stuffs and necessities. Nevertheless, considerable currency was paid out in many cities. In New York, the situation was confused for a time by Governor Lehman's extension of the state holiday through Thursday, and the Chase National Bank, after opening, decided to close in keeping with the Governor's mandate, but the Governor later made it clear that Secretary Woodin's ruling took precedence.

difference between the par value of the pound and the average exchange value. Later as the cost of commodities increased in Britain, the special duty was reduced to the difference between the average value and a fixed value of 40. For example if the department found the average value over two-weeks' period to be \$4.10 in Canadian funds, then special duty would be 30 cents on the pound sterling.

Hon. W. D. Euler asked the Minister some days ago if in view of the further increased commodity prices in Great Britain the ordinary duty should not be collected on a quantity of the pound below \$4.86.

Explaining to the House the circumstances which prompted the government to establish the present basis, the Minister recalled that in September, 1931, the commodity price index, wholesale, in Great Britain was 99.2.
