ELECTION RETURNS FROM FAR WEST

EDMONTON, March 23—Although full returns from yesterday's election are not to hand, enough have been received to indicate that Premier Rutherford has been triumphantly returned by a big majority.

On nomination day there were 4 Liberals and 2 Conservatives elected. Returns so far show 14 more Liberals and 4 more Conservatives elected, making 22 Liberals, 6 Conservatives, 11 districts to hear from and two districts where the elections have been deferred.

Owing to the great extent of territory, the returns are not coming in very rapidly. EDMONTON, March 23—Twenty-six Liberals, three Conservatives, one Socialist and one Independent were elected yesterday. Two contests are deferred. Two constituencies are still unreported.

Out of a total of forty-one, the Government now holds thirty-three. Claresholm and McLeod are not yet heard from. Calgary, High River and Okotoks went Conservative, Arthabasca and Peace River were deferred, Red Deer returned an Independent and Rocky Mountain a Socialist.

MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

At Charlottetown, and within St. James' Hall there, on Tuesday, March 16th, 1909, and at 10.30 o'clock a. m. the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted by the moderator pro tempore, Mr. T. F. Fullerton, with whom were present, Messrs. John Hawley, George McLennan, W. H. Spencer, Geo. E. Ross, D. B. McLeod, R. G. Sinclair, D. N. McPhail, A. S. Stewart, A. Craise, ministers; Ewen McKinnon, Isaac Jay, J. J. McLeod and T. C. James, elders.

Revs. D. McLean and John Valentine being present, were invited to sit and correspond. The clerk read a letter from Mr. S. D. McPhee, Belfast, expressing his thanks for the Presbytery's resolution of sympathy. Took up call from the congregation of Richmond West, to Mr. R. G. Sinclair, Montague, Commissioners from Montague, namely Messrs. W. N. McLeod, W. Sutherland, D. Ross and James Moar testified to Mr. Sinclair's good work there, and stated that if Mr. Sinclair considered it his duty to accept this invitation to another find no obstacle would be placed in his way by the congregation of Montague.

On motion the call was placed in the hands of Mr. Sinclair and accepted by him.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the translation be granted, to take effect on and after the 9th day of May next, and that meeting of Presbytery be held at St. John's Valley, on Thursday, May 13th, at one o'clock p. m., for the induction of Mr. Sinclair, Mr. Ewen McDonald to preside, induct and address the people; Mr. J. H. Hattie to preach, and Mr. R. G. Strathie to address the ministers. Serving of the edict was left in the hands of Mr. Donald McLean.

Mr. Edwin Smith was appointed interim moderator of Montague session, and instructed to have the pulpit declared vacant the first Sabbath after Mr. Sinclair's induction.

An application from Mr. A. B. McLeod for leave of absence from his congregation for three months, was read. On motion the application was granted and the clerk instructed to convey the sympathy of the court to Mr. McLeod and express the hope that change and rest may result in his restoration to health. Mr. Geo. E. Ross was appointed interim moderator of Souris session, and Presbytery expressed its willingness to do everything possible to supply the pulpit during Mr. McLeod's absence. The call from Lochiel, Ontario, to Dr. McPhail, Mt. Stewart, was read and considered. The following commissioners from Mount Stewart, namely Messrs. I. Jay and S. A. Coffin stated the conditions obtaining there and spoke of the good work done by the minister. The call was handed to Dr. McPhail, who asked one month to consider. Presbytery agreed to grant his request with instructions to Dr. McPhail that he forward his decision to the clerk within one month from this date, the clerk to intimate in accordance therewith to

the congregation of Mt. Stewart and West St. Peter's, and to Dr. Hill, moderator of Lochiel session. Mr. Geo. E. Ross presented a report on Evangelism. It was decided on motion that this report be considered at the quarterly meeting on May 11th, and at 12 o'clock noon, on that day Messrs. T. F. Fullerton and Geo. E. Ross were appointed to examine the session records of Mount Stewart and West St. Peter's and report at a future meeting.

Mr. W. H. Spencer called attention to an error in the published minutes of the last meeting of Presbytery. In that minute it was stated that the congregations of Murray Harbor South and Murray Harbor North pass off the list of augmented charges, the former from this date, and the latter after May 31st. The sentence should read: "The congregations of Murray Harbor North and Murray Harbor South pass off the list of augmented charges—the former from this date and the latter after May 31st. This correction was ordered to be made."

Presbytery then adjourned to meet at Montrose for the induction of Mr. Hattie, at Montrose, on Monday, 25th inst., at 7.30 p. m. of which public intimation was given, and this sederunt was closed with the benediction.

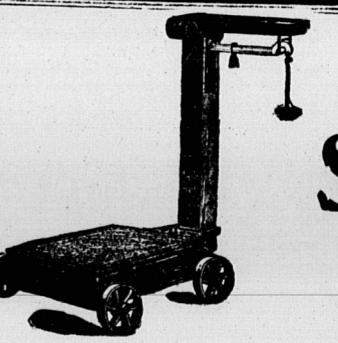
