WOOLLEN MILLS AT LAWRENCE, MASS. CLOSED DOWN.
LAWRENCE, Mass., July 19.—The Lawrence City Council today voted to wait upon President William M. Wood, of the American

Woolen Company to ask him the reason for the shut-down of the mills of the company here and also when they will be re-opened. The mills have been closed one week throwing 15,000 workers out of employment.
BOSTON, July 19.—William M. Wood, president of the American Woolen Company, in a letter to Mayor William P. White, of Lawrence, which Mr. Wood made public tonight, said that the company's mills would be re-opened "as soon as a demand appears for our next season's goods."
