## PREJUDICE AGAINST CUPID PROTESTED

CHICAGO, Nov. 23—Recent discriminatory moves against cupid and motherhood in business and industry today aroused young women business, professional and industrial representatives attending meetings of two national Y.W.C.A. councils.

The council sessions were closed to the public, but from leaders of both the business and professional group and the industrial unit, it was learned resolutions would probably be drawn up protesting the trend toward forcing women who marry, or married women who have babies, to quit their jobs.

These resolutions, if formulated, would later be presented to the national convention of the Young Women's Christian Associations of the United States, which has a membership of 600,000.

## PRODUCE

 MONTREAL, Nov. 24—Potato prices advanced to hold the spotlight on Montreal open produce market last week while eggs eased sharply. Cheese and butter held about steady at the previous week's quotations.

Gains of about 10 cents were registered on the potato market and prices ended the week at \$1.40 to \$1.45 for Prince Edward Island mountains and \$1.35 to \$1.40 for Prince Edward Island cobbler, per 90-pound bag. In 80-pound bags, Prince Edward Island mountains were \$1.10 to \$1.30, cobbler \$1.20 to \$1.25, New Brunswick mountains \$1.25 to \$1.30, Quebec mountains \$1.10 to \$1.15 and Quebec white no 2 stock 90 cents to \$1.10.

Eggs declined about eight cents and graded shipments in cartons or less were selling at 36 to 37 cents a dozen for A-large, 32 to 34 for A-medium, 30 to 32 for A-pullets, 25 1-2 to 28 for B and 24 for C.

Butter was quiet at 26 to 28 1-4 cents per pound for cartons or less and no 1 white lots to retailers were 27 cents for solids and 28 for prints.

Cheese held at 10 3-4 to 11 cents per pound for current arrivals of no 1 Ontario.
