Outlaw War at Bar of Humanity

OTTAWA, April 27.—Hearty endorsement of the world movement to organize public opinion against war is contained in the statement issued by Right Hon. Sir Robert Borden, Canada's war-time Prime Minister, asking for the support of the citizens of the Dominion for the appeal which is being made by the League of Nations Society for 100,000 members.

"The officers of the U. M. W. of A. have refused to accept any reduction in the wage scale, although we have endeavored to satisfy them that a reduced daily wage rate would permit the sale of larger quantities of coal and furnish more days' work per year and more yearly wages than a higher daily wage rate.

"The wage scale paid in 1924 was an increase over the previous year of about seven per cent, and was forced upon the company by the miners' union. The companies only accepted it to minimize the great losses that were experienced during the cessation of production while negotiations were being carried on in January and February, 1924.

"After the proposed reductions in the wage scale will be practically double the scale paid in these mines in 1914. This increase in wages is very much greater than the increase in the cost of living at the present time as compared with

Perils All Around But Czechs Calm

PRAGUE, April 27.—Perhaps on the same principle that insures calm at the heart of a cyclone, Prague, in the very centre of Europe, is impressive in its lack of disturbance. On every side of this relatively tiny state, in area a little more than New York State and in population still a shade more, there is trouble.

On the north there is Germany with still unknown purpose, on the south Hungary with the determination never to accept the treaty decisions as final, on the west a tattered remnant of Austria sinking perhaps to German annexation, finally on the east there is Poland, with many of the same dangers as Czechoslovakia, but also with certain grievances which separate the two Slav nations.

To add to the problems of Czech statesmanship there are various minorities, German, Hungarian, Ruthenian, to say nothing of the Slovak partner, who pulls anything but evenly at times. Yet the Czechs who is running affairs, is calm. He is not only calm, but he is busy, his factories, which once constituted 80 per cent of the machine power of the old Hapsburg Empire, are going strong. His currency has remained stable for nearly two years, his unemployment is by no means excessive. And his capital city has all the air of being the centre of a prosperous and quite settled community.

BETTER CONSERVATIVE ATTITUDE TOWARD PRESTON REPORT JUSTIFIED BY ABANDONMENT

OTTAWA, April 27.—The Ocean Rates Committee of the House of Commons was not long in session before there was given a striking vindication of the attitude taken by the Conservative opposition to the Preston report. When it was placed before the House they charged that its allegations were too sweeping, that they were not supported by proofs, and that for these and other manifestly authoritative reasons it could not be accepted as authoritative.

When the committee got down to work it was naturally thought that the Government counsel, H. J. Symington, K. C. would at once call W. T. B. Preston and proceed to establish the correctness of his case in support of the Peterson contract. Did he do so? Certainly not. Mr. Preston was in the room, and Mr. Henry Drayton strongly urged that he be called to the stand, but Mr. Symington said that he did not report to get at the facts, in other words, that he reported as a fact-finder, not as a fact-creator.

As to its general value, the Government counsel said that this was a matter of opinion. So Mr. Preston was not called. Mr. Symington made the additional important statement that he proposed to get at the facts, in other words, that he reported as a fact-finder, not as a fact-creator.

The public has a right to know the facts with respect to ocean rates and shipping, and the Conservatives are determined that the public shall know them. The Opposition has all along taken the position that if there is a combine indulging in levying toll on Canadian industry it should be abolished. With this platform, the organization, composed entirely of Laymen commenced its work. A simple constitution was outlined by Rev. J. H. Copeland and adopted by the meeting. The first Quarterly to be held in Casumpec, March 28th, 1925.

The first Quarterly Meeting was held in Casumpec, Methook, Church, Saturday, March 28th, 1925. The two sessions were attended by crowds that filled the building to its capacity.

And these men had submitted to the regulations of a Quarterly Plan, whereby for the next three months each was planned and made responsible for these services.

At the roll call the Leader of each circle stood and reported, and the members of his circle stood and repeated the "Scripture Motto" for the quarter. Then all the circles as a body sang "Blest be the tie that binds." Two very important resolutions were adopted by this Quarterly Meeting.

They consisted of the following: (1) As it has been suggested by some, that the various Prayer Circles were organized outside the church, we hereby wish to affirm our loyalty to the church, to which we each belong, and desire a deeper spiritual experience for all its members.

(2) That recognizing in these days there is a wide-spread movement to interpret the Bible from a modern view-point, and thus destroy the unity of the book as the very inspired word of God, we as United Prayer Circles hereby declare ourselves standing solidly on the ground, "That all scripture is given by inspiration of God" 2 Timothy, 3:16; And that no prophesy of the scripture is of private interpretation. "For the prophesy came not in old time by the will of man, but Holy Men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost." 2 Peter 1:21.

THE UNITED PRAYER CIRCLES

In a very real sense a great revival of Christianity has swept the western part of Prince Edward Island. Nothing like it has ever before visited the country, within the memory of the oldest inhabitants, writes a correspondent.

Since the Evangelistic Campaigns of 1920 and 1921, some twenty years ago, a very small group of people have been praying and waiting upon God for a genuine Revival of Christianity. During that period of time that has passed various Evangelists and Preachers have held Campaigns in this area, but with few exceptions the last six months the genuine Revival has not come.

The Evangelist God has used in this instance is Rev. Dr. Sidney well known to Prince Edward Island congregations. The peculiar part of it is however, that whereas most movements of this kind centre around the personality of the Evangelist, in this case it has been the very reverse, as the centre of it all is the praying group or groups associated with the different churches.

The story is as follows:—For nearly six months Dr. Sidney held camp meetings in O. L. W. B. West Point and other places. The average success, that the Evangelistic efforts, very many people expressed a desire in these services to lead better lives, and many of these united with the church of their choice.

At Bloomfield Presbyterian Church during the campaign in October 1924, events seemed to be moving in the same way. There were great crowds attending the services, but a deadness seemed to envelope both Evangelist and people. Feeling the burden of the situation weighing heavily upon them four men and three women met at the home of Mr. Fred McArthur on Saturday evening for a prayer meeting. These people spent the evening in prayer and waiting upon God. They left the meeting knowing that their prayers were answered, and that God would abundantly bless the efforts of Evangelist and workers in these services to lead a better life, and many of these united with the church of their choice.

Monday the community was divided into five districts and arrangements made for a Prayer Meeting every afternoon in each district. And so the Prayer Circles started. From the first, the people attended well. And soon the Prayer Circles brought definite results to the campaign. After the campaign each district decided to continue the Prayer Circle on one evening of each week, so that the people would meet in each others homes for prayer and waiting upon God for Word. These Circles continued their work until January, when a United Prayer Circle Convention was held. For three days, the people gathered to hear addresses by the local Ministers and Evangelists, who were Rev. H. A. Brown, Rev. J. H. Copeland and Rev. W. T. B. Sides and also to pray for an outpouring of the Holy Ghost upon the coming campaigns in Elmsdale and Casumpec. The organization of the United Prayer Circles was formed, a Board of Directors appointed, and the objects of the movement definitely outlined.
